It said if after three games the series score is 2-1 either way, the fifth game will be in Detroit on Sunday. If the score is 3-0 for Detroit after three games, the fifth game will be in Detroit on Tuesday, provided Canadiens win the fourth contest.

DETROIT (CP)—Jack Adams, manager of Detroit Red Wings, Tuesday denied a report on an impending four-for-three National Hockey League deal with Chicago Black Hawks.

Adams said there was no truth in the report, given to The Canadian Press by a competent hockey authority, that goalie Terry Sawchuk, defenceman Benny Witt and forwards Alex Delvecchio and Johnny Wilson would go to the Hawks in exchange for forwards Eddie Litzenberger and Jack McIntyre, plus an unnamed defenceman.

Indians And Braves Picked As Top Rankers

CINCINNATI (AP)—If the major league's player representatives are any good at predictions, it will be Cleveland and Milwaukee in the 1955 baseball world series.

Representatives of 15 of the 16 teams took an informal poll as they opened an executive meeting here Tuesday.

The actual number of votes each club received was not disclosed, but Bob Feller of Cleveland Indians, chief representative for the American League, said the Indians and the Braves were "rather top heavy choices."

New Consecutive Wins Mark Set As Red Wings Dump Canadiens 7-1 In Cup Finals

DETROIT, (CP)—Detroit Red Wings rode roughshod over Montreal Canadiens Tuesday night, little Ted Lindsay having a field day with four goals in the 7-1 win that gave the Detroiters a commanding 2-0 lead in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup final.

The Red Wings did all their scoring in the first two periods and Ken Mosdell counted for Montreal in the third after Dickie Moore of Canadiens had put on a one-man show rushing wildly about the ice in a futile effort to catch up with Lindsay and do battle with him.

Moore was grabbed and held several times by the linesmen, but broke away and kept up his mad rushes. He was first tagged with a minor penalty for slashing, then had a misconduct and finally a game misconduct added by referee Red Storey.

In addition to Lindsay's big four goals, Marcel Pronovost, Alex Delvecchio and Gordie Howe scored for Detroit.

EASY ROMP

With such a romp to an easy victory Tuesday night over the ineffective Canadiens, the Red Wings are strong favorites to wrap up the series which continues in Montreal Thursday.

Going scoreless in the third period, the Red Wings missed a chance to equal or break three Stanley Cup records for a single game. Lindsay's four goals are one short of the record five held by Maurice Richard of Montreal, who is out of this series through a suspension.

Earl (Dutch) Reibel had four assists, one short of the record made by Toe Blake with Montreal nine years ago. Howe's four points on three assists and a goal were two short of the record of six made by Dickie Moore last year in a game against Boston Bruins.

Canadiens were simply outclassed and the Red Wings frolicked about in the goal festal and then coasted home in the third period.

RESHUFFLED LINES

Coach Dick Irvin of Montreal reshuffled his lines at the start, switched goalies early in the first period and sent centre Paul Ronny and defenceman George McAvoy frequently into action. Both players have seen little service so far in the playoffs.

Dutchmen Defeat Hawks In Opening Game Of Series

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen walloped Moncton Hawks 6-2 Tuesday night to take a one-game lead in their best-of-seven Eastern Canada Allan Cup finals. Second game will be played here Thursday.

The Dutchmen, all-Ontario champions, led all the way. They were ahead 2-1 at the end of the first period, 3-1 at the end of the second and splurged for three goals in the last 20 minutes.

The Hawks went through playoff rounds with New Glasgow, N.S., and Ottawa RCAF Flyers without losing a game but they were no match for the Dutchmen who just finished a tough seven-game set with Sault Ste. Marie Greyhounds.

The Ken Laufman-Gerry Theberge-George Scholes line led the Dutchmen to their well-earned triumph by scoring three goals and picking up five assists.

Theberge led the assault with two goals getting the first and last. Laufman, the leading point scorer in the senior A Ontario Hockey Association and high man in the Sault series, scored one. Other scorers were Clarence Martin, Jackie White and Jim Logan.

Billy Sinnott scored the first Moncton goal at 4:15 of the opening period and Dewar Thomson deflected a long shot by Dugger McNeil to finish the Easterners' scoring with less than six minutes remaining in the game.

CONTROLLED PLAY

Nick Pidsodny in the Moncton goal stopped 26 shots against 27 for Keith Woodall of the Dutchmen. Moncton had some good scoring chances but when the Dutchmen settled down they controlled the play.

Nineteen minor penalties were called, 10 to the Hawks. Sinnott was the bad man of the night with four trips to the penalty box.

The Dutchmen went into the lead at 3:10 of the opening period when Theberge battled in a wide pass from George Scholes while Moncton defenceman Joe Lepine served an elbowing penalty.

DeMarco Signs With Sore Hand

NEW YORK (AP)—Welterweight champion Tony DeMarco used his sore right hand Tuesday to sign a formal contract for a title defence against Carmen Basilio at Syracuse, N.Y., June 10.

Both the newly crowned 147-pound king from Boston and the 28-year-old challenger from Cassata, N.Y., signed the official papers after DeMarco had his aching mitt x-rayed at the state athletic commission offices.

Dr. Ira McCown/director of the commission's medical advisory board, examined the 23-year-old Bostonian, found no breaks in the injured hand and passed on the news to Julius Helfand, chairman of the commission.

DeMarco, who injured the hand in winning the title from Johnny Saxton in Boston last Friday night, had to undergo the exam to get a renewal of his New York licence. He had been placed on the "unavailable list" in his home state of Massachusetts pending a routine medical check.

QUIET CAME THE DAWN

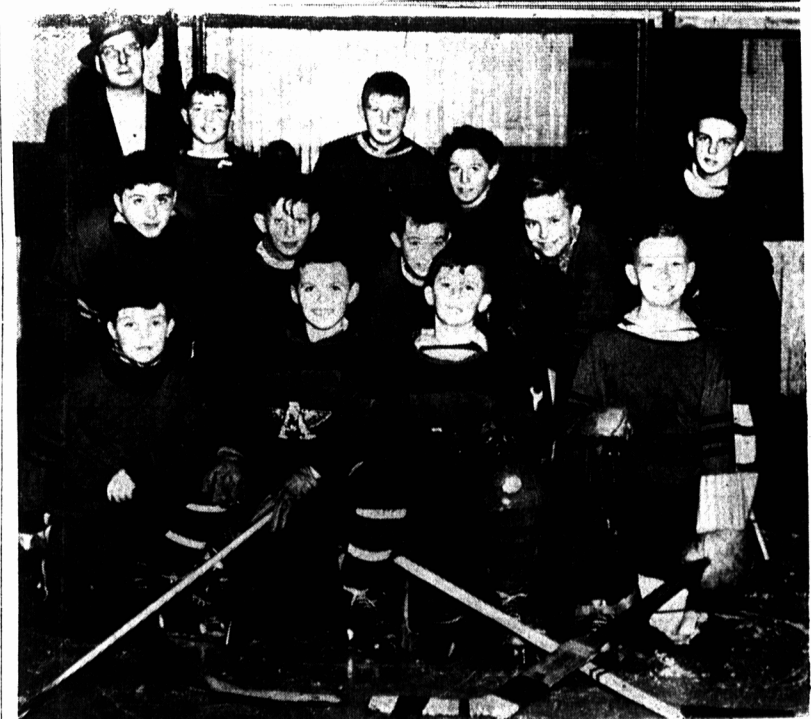
