A BAD CANVASS.

We have heard, from several directions, that the agent of *La Patrie*, of Montreal, is now in this Province at work among our fellow citizens of French descent, and that his canvass, briefly, stated is this: Take *La Patrie* and support Sir Wilfrid Laurier, because he is French; vote against Sir Charles Tupper and the Orangemen.

The Messrs. Tarte have, of course, a right to send an agent here to ask subscriptions for the Liberal organ, for which Mr. Greenshields of the Drummond Railway deal, put up \$20,000—though L'Impartial and Le Moniteur Acadien are much more worthy the support of our French-speaking people. But we protest against the Laurier-Tarte party canvass. It is not true, and it is entirely opposed to "the dearest wish" of Sir Wilfrid's heart, as expressed at New Glasgow! It is calculated to provoke race bitterness and strife and to prevent union and concord among the elements of Canada's population. Moreover, it is transparently weak; for if, upon this ground the French-Canadians ought to vote for the government, it is clear that upon this ground the English-speaking electors ought to vote for the opposition. No! the electors of Canada, French and English speaking alike, are in duty bound to look into the records of the opposing parties, and to consider the existing situation of the country, without regard to the race or religion of the political leaders,—and then decide which party is the most worthy of their support in the coming contest.

RATHER LATE

It is reported that the officers and men of the S. S. Stanley have heretofore been unable to obtain new uniforms since the present Business Administration undertook to manage public affairs. But, now, after four years have passed away, and in the face of a general election, an order has been issued for the new uniforms that have been so long needed. This is consistent with "the high politics" exhibited in the boasted increase of wages on the government railways just before the government calls upon the employees to vote.

It used to be a complaint against the Conservative government that they neglected the interests of men in the public service here. But the late government had the excuse that P. E. Island had sent a majority of its representatives to support the opposition in parliament, and so misrepresent matters as to destroy their influence at Ottawa. With Sir Louis Davies in the Cabinet, with a majority at his back, better treatment was expected. This hope, also, has proved vain—until the eve of a Parliamentary election! To the injury all along done the government employees in this province there has now been added insult. The New Liberals evidently expect to catch the votes of the Government's employees by their late bestowal of "favors."

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Ottawa Citizen: Sir Louis Davies was nominated on Saturday. Should he succeed in securing his own election he will occupy a seat to the left of Mr. Speaker in the next House.

Montreal Gazette: There seems to be an idea among some of the Laurier newspapers that votes can be secured for their party by making fun of the recent accident Sir Charles Tupper met with. They possibly estimate aright the intelligence of their co-believers in Liberalism as it is; but it does seem to an outside observer that those who are tickled by such journalistic Boxerism are hardly worth the offence it causes to decent-minded men.

THE NEW BRIDGE.

REFERRING to the letter of our correspondent "Ratepayer," we are glad to be able to report that the protest of the ratepayers of the vicinity has resulted in an order to extend the covering of the bridge on the north, so that it will admit of a sidewalk for foot passengers. Even now the new bridge is very far from meeting the expectations of those who hoped to see in it the complement of the Government bridge and approach to the park roadway at the other end of the pond and a fitting western entrance to the town.

It is feared by many persons that the space beneath the bridge is not sufficiently large to admit of the passage of all the water pouring into the Spring Park brook during the spring freshets. We hope that this fear will not be realized. It is said that the culvert of the new bridge is larger than that of the bridge below at the entrance of Government House.
