IN THE HOUSE, YESTERDAY.

THE situation in the Legislative Assembly, yesterday, when the Government party (without a majority) was seeking cover and striving to keep back the proofs of its deceit and treachery, was in many respects laughable. But it was, also, disgraceful. An attempt was, without doubt, been made to cheat Mr. Wise and the people of the second district of Queen's County. As the man who has been deceived by an unprincipled horse-wapper is indignant and strives to recover his property, so Mr. Wise is determined, if possible, to hold his position. He adopted the British plan, when he had lost confidence in his party, of resigning his seat; and this he did on the express and essential condition, annexed, that an election should forthwith be held to fill the vacancy. The condition has not been fulfilled; and, this being so, Mr. Wise is maintaining that the resignation is void. The Opposition, in the House, is at all events justified in demanding the production of the resignation, in scrutinising every word that is in it, in taking advantage of the slightest flaw that may be found; and in demanding that an inquiry by the House or a committee thereof shall be made into all the facts and circumstances, connected with it. Where has the resignation been since it was written in February or March last? Why was it not acted upon in accordance with the law? There are questions in which the people are interested and which their representatives have a right to ask. The Speaker is making a record, involving not alone the damages which Mr. Wise may claim for being wrongfully deprived of his seat, but also his own personal character. It is to be hoped that he will not attempt to withhold from Mr. Wise the justice that is due to any British subject who claims to have suffered wrong,—the right of a trial of his case and a verdict by his peers. That Mr. Wise possesses, in the meantime, a right to sit and vote in the House admits of no more doubt than the right of Mr. Farquharson to sit and vote in case of a charge that he stands disqualified with reason of his contracts and dealings by the Dominion Government.

It is significant of the changed conditions that now prevail, that the Government was, twice yesterday, compelled to give way and back down before the Opposition's attack. They had to produce the writs of two of the bye-elections at the proper time, and they had to submit a copy of Mr. Wise's resignation, while a copy of the Lieutenant-Governor's speech is yet to be read.

We must congratulate the Leader of the Opposition on the ability displayed in the discussions of yesterday. The value of a lawyer on the Opposition side of the House was at once felt in the telling points made by Mr. A. A. McLean; while Messrs Shaw and Campbell, who took leading parts in the proceedings, were, as well as the Leader, keen and vigorous as ever.

It was the Hon. Mr. Rogers who moved the "standing order" yesterday, and turned his constituents (including many young ladies) out of doors. Probably Mr. Rogers thought that his chances of re-election would not be improved if his constituents were allowed to remain and hear the discussion.

A New York paper remarks that this is the sort of a record, which those who like that sort of a record could not fail to like. The record, however, would be far more impressive were it not for the notorious fact that no man ever made as many speeches and traveled as far to make them who at the end of his oratorical campaign could point to more barren results. Bryan is a conspicuous illustration of the folly of those who labor under the impression that they "shall be heard for their much speaking."

—As bearing upon the case now before the House and the country, the following extracts from the law—quoted by Mr. A. A. McLean yesterday—will be interesting to the public:—

(2) Or a member may address and cause to be delivered to the Speaker, a declaration of his intention to resign his seat, made in writing, under his hand and seal, before two subscribing witnesses, which declaration may be so made and delivered either during a session of the Legislature, or in the interval between two sessions, and the Speaker shall, upon receiving such declaration, forthwith notify the Lieutenant-Governor thereof, and an entry of the declaration so delivered to the Speaker shall be thereafter made in the Journals of the Assembly.

"The Assembly shall have full power to commit to prison any person who shall by resolution of the said Assembly be adjudged guilty of any contempt or breach of its privileges, and the Sergeant-at-Arms of the said Assembly shall be the officer to carry out any order of said Assembly made under this section."
