Provincial Exhibition.

YESTERDAY was one of the best days Charlottetown has seen. It was a fine day and a sober day. There was no drunkenness, though the town was full of people, many of whom would, under the old order of things, have been drunk to a dead certainty.

There was a better display than the indications of the previous evening would lead one to expect. The exhibit of roots and vegetables, the writer heard many say, was not inferior to that at the Dominion Exhibition in Halifax.

FURNITURE

Mr. W. A. Hickey, upholsterer, exhibits a beautiful and unique suit of furniture. It is of walnut, inlaid with gold and garnet silk tapestry, trimmed with garnet satin.

BREAD

When examining the exhibit of Mr. Quirk, that of Mr. Wm. Murray, of Pownal Street, had not been sent in. It attracted much attention yesterday, and its quality was justly admired.

PHOTOGRAPHY

Mr. Lewis exhibits a collection of excellent photographs. Some of the subjects are beautiful, and the tone and finish of the pictures would be counted superior anywhere.

FRET WORK

Of fret work there are several very elegant exhibits. Among these is a clock, shown by Mr. Chas. Brown. The manufacture of this clock, or rather its case, gave recreation to Mr. Brown for about three months.

BOOKBINDING

Mr. G. H. Hazard contributes first-class specimens of the work he turns out of his book-binding, and also a very nice assortment of stationery, with monograms, etc.

THE IMPROVED AIR PIPE ROTARY CHURN—This is a revolving box, without any dasher, calculated to bring the butter without breaking the grain.

FRUIT

Of fruit there is also a collection creditable to the Province. Mr. Abram Gill, of Little York, shows a case of nine varieties of fruit, for which the judges justly recommended a prize.

FLOWERS

There is a very fair share of flowers, though the competition is not active. Messrs. Edward Bayfield, Herbert Hazard and Miss L. Boyver, Miss Heard, Mrs. George Davis and Mrs. John Williams are among the exhibitors.

MISCELLANEOUS. The ladies make fine exhibits of fancy work, besides mats, quilts, etc.

An elegant base burner stove attracts attention as we enter the exhibition. Must have been made in Yankee-land. No it wasn't, either. It was turned out of the foundry of C. Fawcett, of Sackville, N. B., and Henry Beer, Esq., is the agent here.

Mr. Donald McKenzie exhibits a "Champion" horse hoe and moulding plough—the superiority of which is evident in a moment to the farmer's eye.

The Regatta.
