**NO SURVIVORS**  
TOKYO (AP)—The United States Navy Thursday said a PBM patrol bomber missing since Wednesday with 17 aboard crashed into a

4,500-foot island mountain 50 miles off southern Japan. There were no apparent survivors. Search planes identified wreckage on Yakushima Island, off the main island of Kyushu, as that of the missing amphibian. The plane disappeared five hours after it took off from Iwakuni air base, in western Japan, early Wednesday. Originally it was reported on a routine flight to Hong Kong, but the navy said today it actually was headed for the Philippines.

**BLIND MARCH ON ROME**  
ORVIETO, Italy (AP)—A ragged column of blind people shuffled down the road from this hilltop city in Umbria today, soaked by rain but vowing to complete their 250-mile march to Rome. The 70 men and women, led by sympathizers, are campaigning for more government aid to the blind. They started their "march of misery" from Florence on May 8.
