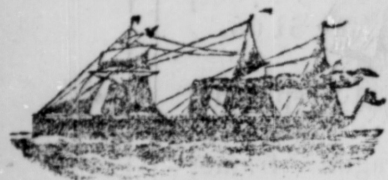

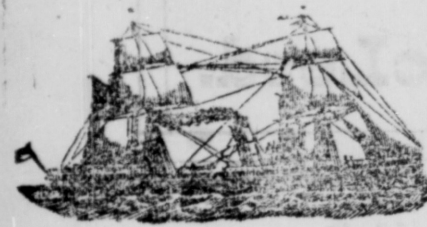

DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS.

Montreal Prices—Cheese Firm, Butter Quiet and Steady.

Cheese continues firm in its tone, according to late advices from Montreal. The prices range from 7 1/2 to 7 3/4. Ontario goods holders are asking 8c and over and are not frequent sellers. Butter is quoted at from 16 1/2 to 17c for finest creamery, but business is not active.

A moderate demand for smoked meats and lard is reported, with no change in prices. Canadian pork is quoted at \$16 to \$16 50 per bbl.

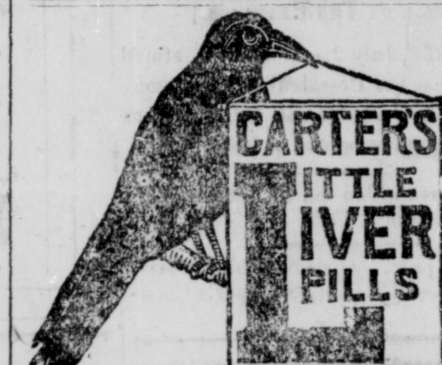
News Notes.

Liverpool is going ahead in the race for harbor improvements. The New Canada graving dock is being run ahead at a great rate, and it is said will break all previous records in time of construction. Other works are in contemplation, and the port seems to have been thoroughly awakened up.

Here is a curious prediction, signed by Mr Gladstone, in the Nineteenth Century, over twenty years ago: "Our first site in Egypt, be it by larceny or be it by emption, will be the almost certain egg of a North African empire, that will grow and grow until another Victoria and another Albert—titles of the lake sources of the White Nile—come within our borders, and all we finally join hands across the Equator with Natal and Cape Town; to say nothing of the Tigris and the Orange River on the South, and Abyssinia or Zanzibar to be swallowed by way of viaticum on our journey."

There are complaints in the British House of Commons and the London press that the army on service in the Sudan was not provided with an X-ray apparatus for the benefit of the wounded, and that the stretchers in use at the battle of Atbara had no sunshades attached to them. That such complaints should be made shows how much the care of the wounded has advanced in recent years. The demand for an X-ray apparatus may seem to some people an unreasonable, but they had one in the A'rid campaign, and it proved very useful.

An independent political organization is being organized at Toronto embracing Roman Catholics of all political stripes. A few days ago a preliminary meeting of representative Catholics was held and decided to draw up a constitution. A majority meeting decided that the preamble of the constitution should set forth that the organization was formed to protest against the present representation of Irish Catholics in the cabinets of the Dominion and Ontario and to obtain a larger Catholic representation on the floor of the House Government officials are not eligible for membership.
