

## Montague Council Decides To Acquire Mahar Property

MONTAGUE — A short business meeting of the Montague Town Council was held last night in the council chambers. Present were councillors VanDerstine, Fraser, Clements, and Greene. Mayor Bruce H. Yeo, presided. Also present were John White, town policeman, and Fire Chief Doug Coffin.

Fire Chief Coffin presented a concise report on the recently purchased fire engine, obtained from crown assets, and stated that the truck and equipment, if purchased in the normal way, would cost between \$2,000 and \$3,000.

During the meeting, it was decided the town would purchase the Mahar property, and that tenders be called immediately for the sale and removal of the buildings.

Two permits, one to build and the other to move a house into the town, were granted, if done in accordance with town by-laws. Following committee reports, the meeting adjourned.

## PM Watches Canadian Brigade In Marchpast

By ALAN DONNELLY Canadian Press Staff Writer HEMER, West Germany (CP) The manpower of Canada's NATO army brigade paraded in split and polished smartness before Prime Minister Diefenbaker Monday in a ceremony with a unique feature.

For the first time citizenship certificates were presented on foreign soil by a Canadian prime minister. They went to eight Canadian soldiers, natives of four European countries. Sergeant F. V. Lazlo of Montreal, born in Hungary and member of the Royal 22nd Regiment for 4½ years, blinked back tears of emotion as he received the document before more than 3,000 comrades. The other seven stood stiffly at attention.

The world-touring prime minister, after standing in a jeep to drive past the 12 units, went to a loudspeaker microphone to express thanks for what he called a marvellous showing.

**BRINGS BACK MEMORIES** With a guess at what they might be thinking after 1½ hours on parade he recalled how he had been in a similar parade while overseas as a lieutenant 42 years ago for the then Prime Minister Sir Robert Borden. "I know something of your feel-

ings about visiting VIPs. I am sure there has been no change since in the expression used by the armed forces about men in my position."

In a serious vein he told the men—as their wives and children ringed the parade square to listen—that they are here to protect what Canadian citizenship stands

for. The soldiers had "the abiding thanks and appreciation of the Canadian people."

The men then swung past the reviewing stand, six abreast, for the marchpast.

The prime minister and his wife had lunch with some 100 officers and their wives, including high ranking officers of allied NATO armies.
