**Never Bend Wins Futurity At Aqueeduct**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Never Bend, beaten a week previously in the world's richest futurity race, barged back into the two-year-old stakes at Aqueeduct Saturday with a come-from-behind victory in the \$132,150 Futurity.

But before the son of Nasrullah from Cain Guy Stable was made the dual winner, he had to withstand a foul claim. Never Bend, trained by Willie Shoemaker finished the six furlongs with a margin of 3/4 lengths over the Greyhound, leading Class, Pack Trip, an outsider, trained by another 2 1/2 lengths.

Don Pierce, riding Outing Class, claimed a foul against Never Bend and Shoemaker. He charged \$100,000 for the race, but was rebuffed by Never Bend after the start of the race. But after looking at movies, stewards sided with the claim.

Never Bend, chalking up his first stakes triumph, won the fourth victory in six starts, stepping the distance in 1:17.14 seconds. He earned \$94,347.50 to run his total earnings to \$193,672.50.

**Stampeders Defeat Als**

**CALGARY (CP)** Calgary Stampeders came up with several crucial defensive moves, and defeated Montreal Alouettes 17-7 Saturday night in a Canadian Football League interlocking game.

Stampeders moved two points ahead of Saskatchewan Roughriders in second place in the Western Conference. The loss left Montreal in third place in the Eastern Conference with five points.

Fullback Lovell Coleman, substituting for injured Earl Lamford, scored a four-quarter touchdown for Calgary to clinch victory after halfback Ed Buchanan counted a touchdown in the second quarter. Larry Robinson converted both and kicked a 24-yard field goal.

Montreal's lone touchdown was scored by workhorse George Dixon early in the game. Bobby Jack Oliver converted.

Calgary intercepted four passes from quarterback Sandy Stephens and Joe Francis. The Calgary end and on another three occasions threw the quarterbacks for large losses.

A crowd of about 18,000 watched Montreal take advantage of a poor first-quarter punt to take possession on the Calgary 40.

Steps passed to Marvin Luster, who was dropped in his tracks on the three-yard line Dixon crunched over on the next play.

After Montreal fumbled a punt, Calgary's quarterback, Eagle Day pitched to end Pete Manning to the Als' six-yard line. Buchanan took over from there and in two carries led the three.

Less than a minute to go in the half, Day completed a 31-yard pass to Buchanan and Robinson was good on his 24-yard field goal.

Midway through the final quarter, Calgary marched from its own 45, with Coleman scoring for two yards out.
