The public schools of Columbia, Ga., are attended by 513 white and 542 colored children.

Canton, Me., is excited over the failure of Otis Hayford, the most prominent merchant in the district. Liabilities \$100,000.

It is estimated that the apple crop of the United States this year will amount to two hundred millions of barrels, but thousands of these will rot in the orchards.

The question of burning the garbage of New York city is again raised, and a committee has been appointed to inquire into the method and cost of this manner of its disposition.

Postmaster General Maynard says: "I am going to Tennessee, where I left some years ago all the property I possess in the charge of a man who was once a part of it. I have a curiosity to see what he has done with the rest of it."

The Upton (Canada) bush fires are all burned out, and but little is observed now save the blackened ruins of crops and houses. The work of relief is progressing slowly and there seems a prospect of but little distress now that cannot be relieved from local sources.

Mrs. Ellen Shaughnessy, of New York, while cooking gruel Sunday evening, put in a handful of arsenic, thinking it was salt. Ellen and her two children, aged 13 and 8, Mrs. Ann Carson, and Hugh Cassidy, partook of the gruel; Cassidy died and the others are very ill, but are recovering. The arsenic had been bought to kill rats.

Under the auspices of the British Goat Society it was resolved to have a kid dinner during one of the days of the show held in the Alexandria Palace. The viands were to consist solely of the flesh of the kid at different ages, dressed in various ways to represent fowl, mutton, lamb, veal, and fawn. The object is to bring this article of food into more general consumption.

An interesting and wonderful trial by jury has just been finished at Honesdale, Pa. Three children—one girl and two little boys—aged respectively nine, seven and six years, were arrested and charged with a criminal assault upon a little girl aged eight, one 'Angie' Myers. The prosecutrix swore that while returning home from school she was set upon by the three defendants and so terribly punished that the loss of her hearing and one eye was the result. The children were acquitted.

The following extract from a sermon preached by Sydney Smith to Her Majesty Queen Victoria on her accession to the throne is, thinks London "Truth," worthy of all recalling: "Extinguishing in your heart the fiendish love of military glory from which your sex does not necessarily exempt you, and to which the wickedness of flatteries may urge you. Say upon your death bed, 'I have made few orphans in my reign; I have made few widows. My object has been peace. I have used all the might of my character and all the power of my situation to check the irascible passions of mankind and turn them to the arts of honest industry.'"

A leading officer in one of the Montreal courts was charged with never going to bed sober. Of course he indignantly denied the soft impeachment, and he gave the particulars of a certain night in proof. We quote his own words: "Soon after I got in bed my wife said: 'Why, husband, what is the matter with you? You act so strangely.' 'There is nothing the matter with me,' said I; 'nothing at all. I'm sure there is,' said she; 'you don't act natural at all. Shan't I get up and get something for you? And she got up, lighted the candle and came to the bedside to look at me, shading the light with one hand. 'I knew there was something odd about you,' said she. Why, you are sober!"
