

Charge Improper Profits Given Firm For Naval Guns

OTTAWA (CP) — Commons opposition members Wednesday accused the government of handing improper and unjustified profits to a firm that manufactured naval guns during the Korean War.

Defence Production Minister J. St. Laurent said federal payments to Sorel Industries Ltd. of Sorel, Que. were reasonable and covered only part of the company's losses in keeping its plant intact after the Second World War.

Mr. Howe, whose departmental estimates were being debated, said under sharp fire from Progressive Conservative and CCF members, and he engaged in a series of arm bouts with them.

The federal contract for 48 guns with the Sorel firm was criticized mainly on the grounds that the government had absorbed \$2,800,000 of the 1945-50 maintenance cost of the plant and that it had paid more for the weapons than the United States Navy had for similar weapons from the same plant.

Called "HANDOUT" (PC-Perth) described the maintenance contribution as "an unjustified handout to the company."

"It was highly improper and unjustifiable," said Donald Fleming (PC-Toronto Eglington).

Prof. S. Zapflyn (PC-Dauphin) said the government had "directly subsidized" the company by installing about \$6,000,000 worth of machinery in the plant to enable the 3.5-inch guns to be produced.
