POLICE COURT.—Two summonses against Catherine Oiler for violating the C. T. A., were dismissed this morning. One against Richard Collins for the same offence was also dismissed.

In the Collins case a lad testified to having sold liquor on several occasions, and accounted for the proceeds to his elder brother, John Collins. The boy's father strongly objected to his being sworn. The magistrate held that he understood the nature of the oath and at the same time delivered a severe reprimand to the father for allowing his son to engage in the traffic.

Francis Finnegan, an Upper Queen St. saloon keeper, was fined \$50 and costs or two months' imprisonment for selling intoxicants. The same defendant, whose premises had recently been raided by the police, was fined \$50 and costs or two months' imprisonment for keeping intoxicating liquors for sale. The liquors in respect of which the offence was committed, consisting of six bottles of whiskey and a quantity of beer, were ordered to be destroyed by the peace officers entrusted with the execution of the search warrant.
