Fraudulent Revision of the Lists.

THE Patriot asks the question, "Can fraud be practised in the revision of the Voters' List?" and goes on to discuss the contents of a letter which it has received from Prince County, in which it is alleged that "Tory wirepullers intend stuffing the lists with the names of unqualified persons."

We know nothing of any improper applications being made by Liberal-Conservatives in Prince County or either of the other Counties, and we believe the result will show that Liberal-Conservatives are doing their work in connection with the revision in thorough compliance with the letter and spirit of the law.

Adulteration of Food.

LOCAL officials of the Inland Revenue Department have inspected various kinds of food and drink on sale throughout Canada, and the Commissioner of Inland Revenue has tabulated a summary statement, by which it appears, that of 89 samples of butter analyzed, 76 were found to be genuine, and 13 adulterated; of 73 samples of cheese, 70 were genuine, and 3 adulterated; of 33 samples of cream of tartar, 20 were genuine, and 13 adulterated; of 85 samples of coffee, 49 were genuine, 23 adulterated, and 3 doubtful; of 45 samples of drugs, 26 were genuine, 5 adulterated, and 14 doubtful; of 164 samples of liquors, 123 were genuine, 23 adulterated, and 10 doubtful; of 148 samples of milk, 113 were genuine, 28 adulterated, and 7 doubtful; of 194 samples of spices, 78 were genuine, 111 adulterated, and 5 doubtful. Thus, in 977 packages 219 were adulterated and 39 doubtful.

It is regretted that the per centage of adulterated samples, more especially of butter, coffee and spices, has largely increased. The latter, while not so serious to the public health as many other adulterations, is, at the best, a commercial fraud, and is so serious in extent that the question of licensing spice mills and systematically inspecting the product seems to be one which may be urged upon the Government at no distant day.

—Newfoundland affairs are demanding attention in London just now. Mr. Redmond intended asking some questions on the subject in the House of Commons a few nights ago, but omitted doing so, probably at the request of the Government. In the meantime Rev. Mr. Howley is there working up public opinion. He declares that if England does not speedily send a commissioner to enquire into the infraction of the treaty of Utrecht, and secure redress for these British subjects whom the French have wronged, Newfoundland will be compelled to appeal to Washington.

—The St. John Sun says: The Charlottetown Patriot is of opinion that an increase in bank deposits is not an indication of prosperity, inasmuch as Canada has borrowed large sums of money in foreign markets. Canada has in her public works a permanent equivalent for the money she has borrowed. The Government does not borrow money for the mere purpose of having it stored in the banks. News Notes.

An alligator and an English sparrow engaged in a battle near Darien, Ga., the other day. The sparrow provoked the fight by snipping at the bird, which in turn flew furiously at its ugly antagonist, aiming with precision at the saurian's eyes. The alligator finally gave up the contest and took to the river.

Benjamin Johnson, it is said, owns a farm in Rush Valley, U. T., upon which he has just discovered a mine of natural shoe blacking. An analysis of this peculiar material shows that it contains 17 per cent. carbon, 34 per cent. aluminum, and the remainder clay. When taken out the material is moist and soft, and when used as a shoe blacking produces a fine polish, which is not easily destroyed.

Yeast has been largely used in medicine for many years, especially in Europe, where the highest opinion is entertained of its valuable qualities. It is used not only in scurvy, diphtheria, scarlet fever, measles, and cholera infantum, but in cases of typhus it is actually a specific. Its entire harmlessness permits its use in large quantities, and to break up severe cases of typhus, from 100 to 200 grains are administered. In severe cases of diphtheria six to eight grains of unfermented fluid yeast are given to children every hour, and the mouth and face are mopped at the same intervals with a mixture of one part yeast and five or six parts water.

A Time For all Things.

Timeliness is as important as fitness. The right thing may become wrong unless it is in the right time. Look well to the time of doing anything; there is a time for all things. Choose the right time for saying things. If your wife looks weary and worn out, be sure it is not the right time to tell her that the dinner is not hot, or that the bread is sour. Comfort her—cheer her up.

If you are annoyed or vexed at people, just remember it is not the right time to speak. Close your mouth—shut your teeth together firmly, and it will save you many a useless and unavailing regret and many a bitter enemy.

If you happen to feel a little cross—and who among us does not at some time or other? do not select that season for reproving your noisy household flock. One word spoken in passion will make a scar that a summer of smiles can hardly heal over.

If you are a wife never tease your husband when he comes home, weary, from his day's business. It is not the right time. Do not ask him for expensive outlays when he has been talking about hard times—it is, most assuredly, the wrong time.

If he has entered upon an undertaking against your advice, do not seize on the moment of its failure to say, "I told you so!" In fact, it is never the right time for those four monosyllables.

O, if people only knew enough to discriminate between the right time and the wrong, there would be less domestic unhappiness, less silent sorrow and less estrangement of heart. The greatest calamities that overshadow our lives have sometimes their germ in matters as apparently slight as this. If you would only pause, reader, before the stinging taunt, or the biting sneer, or the unkind scold passes your lips—pause just long enough to ask yourself, "Is it the right time for me to speak?" you would shut the door against many a heart-ache.
