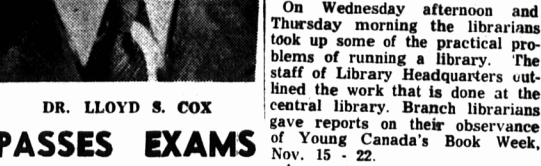

OF NO ADVANTAGE

POTATO BOARD DISCUSSION

(Continued from page 1)
BOARD "KICKED OUT"

Richard MacPhee of New Haven who was a member of the previous Marketing Board asked why the Government saw fit "to kick the Board out" when it had been given a majority at a plebiscite. He expressed the opinion that if the people's wishes were to be ignored, it would be just as logical for Mr. Bell to say after the election, "I don't care how the people voted, I am going to take over the Government."

Mr. Lief Howatt of North Wiltshire said that the Government was running the country, and if people believe that the Government is acting in the best interests of everyone then it must be assumed that they did the right thing in appointing the Marketing Board. "The people spoke at the last Provincial election and we must be satisfied with that decision for another four years," said Mr. Howatt.

When a voice from the audience said, "You must be a strong Liberal," Mr. Howatt hotly affirmed that he was a strong Conservative.

Mr. Donald A. MacDonald entered the discussion at this point to ask Mr. Cullen what were the questions on the ballot and what was the Board's majority following the plebiscite. He said that the question asked "are you in favour of the marketing Board not a Marketing Board." He assumed that when the people were voting that they were voting to keep the existing Board in office. Mr. Cullen said that he did not have a copy of the ballot with him and he would not trust his memory to say exactly what was on the ballot to quote what majority the Board had received.

Mr. Howatt said that he thought Mr. MacDonald was making an issue out of a small point. "The Board or a Board," he said, "is very little difference. Mr. Matheson is my Premier the same as he is Bob Connolly's Premier and I believe he was acting in good faith when he formed the new Potato Board this Fall."

THE MIDDLE MAN

The next question dealt with was, "What agencies operate between the producer and consumer?" Mr. MacDonald enumerated the dealer, transportation, the broker, the retailer and consumer. The costs which he said were fairly uniform were: the potato bag, 13 cents; assembler, 5 cents; dealer, varied amounts, transportation 50 cents per 100; broker, 3 cents; wholesaler, 15 cents and the retailer's profit. On the average he said it would amount to about \$1.00. Mr. MacDonald said that these amounts were fairly consistent whether the price received by the consumer was high or low.

Mr. Reid admitted that the producer got only a small part of the consumer's dollar but felt that if the middle man was not performing a useful function he would not be long in that position.

Donald MacDonald said that about 8 per cent of the potatoes went through brokers and wondered whether these costs in many instances, especially in the case of large chain stores, could not be eliminated. He estimated that brokerage costs were amounting to \$100,000 a year on Island sales.

QUALITY

It was generally conceded that the quality of Island potatoes was excellent and the question arose as to whether Island potatoes were receiving the premium to which they were entitled. The panel chairman asked whether it was thought warehouse grading would be more advantageous to maintaining quality than individual grading. It was the unanimous opinion that warehouse grading did offer certain advantages over the other since it could be assumed that those who are engaged in the work consistently could do a better job, than the individual who is working at grading on occasions only. Mr. Reid felt that if quality is maintained, it would eventually find its proper price. He emphasized the importance of proper advertising in this regard.

PACKAGING

Max Thompson felt that the 75lb bag was the most desirable for use among the producer. He was of the opinion that producers should exercise every care to see that the potatoes shipped by them were of the highest quality. "Many small bruises" he said "which do not show plainly when they are freshly made, can look pretty bad before the potatoes reach their destination.

Submission That Patents Control Industrial Arts

OTTAWA (CP) - The Halsey royal commission studying Canada's patent, copyright and trade mark laws has scheduled a new series of hearings next month for further argument on a submission that big corporations can hide behind multitudes of patents to gain control of an industrial art.

The submission was made by two Canadian newspapers, the Regina Leader-Post and the Saskatoon Star-Phoenix. Their 34-page brief, completed before the commission Tuesday, urged sweeping changes in the patent law to prevent corporate control of industry and markets and the setting of prices through patent pools.

Chief Justice J. L. Halsey of Nova Scotia, commission chairman, set Dec. 1 as the start of new hearings after spokesmen from the Chemical Institute of Canada, the Chemical Institute of Canada and the Canadian Manufacturers Association requested time to reply. The patent institute spokesman said the newspapers' brief contained "inaccuracies."

Clifford Sifton, proprietor of the two newspapers, will be given an opportunity to reply to the rebuttal argument. He indicated his reply on behalf of the newspapers probably would be in written form.

The newspapers' brief urged the court injunctions prohibiting infringement of patents should be denied corporate patent pool holders who use their powers to restrain trade and control industry. Royal ties should be restricted, the brief said, and all patent pools should be required to register with the restrictive trade practices commission.

The brief urged that patents found invalid by the courts should be invalid for all. There had been cases where a patent holder continued to collect royalties from a court order of invalidity. It said the criminal law prohibiting the fixing of resale prices should be made applicable to patented goods.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT

Hon. Mr. Cullen in addressing the meeting later in the evening, discussed the work of the Industrial development committee and the attempts it was making to bring new industry to the Province, specifically peat moss and the drying of grass for feed.

He expressed the hope that farmers would consider investing surplus capital in the developing of Island processing plants.

At an election of officers the following resulted: President, Archie Johnston, president and representative to the Provincial Board; 1st Vice-President, Wallace Mallett, Union Road; 2nd Vice-President, Charlie Jones, Pownall; Secretary, Mrs. W. E. MacKinnon, U.S.G.

RESOLUTIONS

Resolutions adopted by the meeting asked that reports of checks tests of milk and cream for butterfat by Government inspectors go directly to the producer; that wireless telephones be provided for snowplow equipment and that roads be classified as to priority for snow removal; that the present floor price of 58 cents per pound on butter be continued; that the freight assistance policy on Western feed grain be continued; that the department of Agriculture be commended for its attempt to have price supports applied according to known formula for designated products; that the congratulations of the meeting be extended to Messrs. Sylvester McAuley of Campbell's Cove and Anselm McDonald of East Baltic for their potato championships wins at the Royal Winter Fair and at the Maritime Winter Fair; that the satisfaction of the meeting be expressed for the recent reduction in electric power rates; that the Federation continue to press for equalization of tariffs on potatoes with the U. S. A. at present minimum rates; that there be one uniform time for Prince Edward Island, Atlantic Standard, and that the Uniformity of Time Act be amended at the next session of the Legislature to make it enforceable.
