Chronic Care Centre Receives New Name

SUMMERSIDE — "Prince County Hospital Annex" was the new name given to the Summerside Chronic Care Centre on Thursday evening at the first meeting of the recently elected 1959 board of directors of Prince County Hospital.

The name was deemed appropriate by the board because the building had served as the Prince County Hospital for half a century until construction of a new hospital at Summerside, at which time the northern end of the building was used to provide accommodation for public health offices, and the remainder of the building became known as the Chronic Care Centre, where elderly, chronically ill ladies were cared for.

Restrictions on visiting at Prince County Hospital, which had been in effect from the time of the influenza epidemic, were removed on the recommendation of the medical staff. However, only two visitors will be permitted to visit a patient at any one time, and only husbands and parents will be allowed to visit patients in the maternity section of the hospital.

Dr. Taylor, a surgeon, from Saint John, N.B., will be temporarily on the hospital staff during the absence of Dr. J. K. Beer and Dr. A. R. Grant, two Prince County Hospital surgeons who will

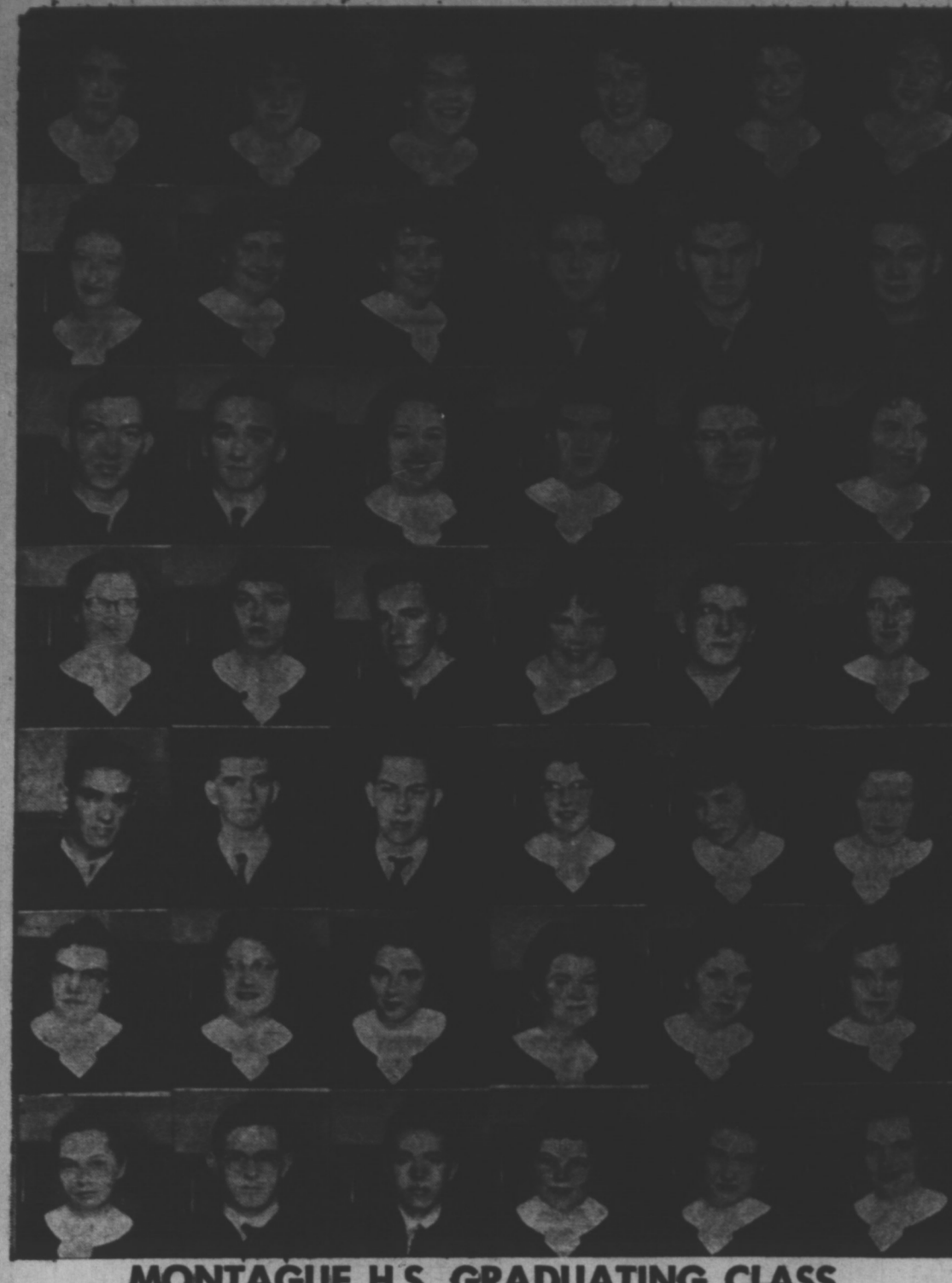
