11 OTHERS PLEAD INNOCENT

Lobster Fishing Infraction Bring Fines To Fishermen

ALBERTON BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — Eleven fishermen, chiefly from Alberton South, entered pleas of not guilty to infractions of lobster regulations when they appeared here yesterday before Magistrate R.S. Hinton, while fines were levied in three other cases.

All contested cases were adjourned until July 9 at Alberton, to be further adjourned to a date when it is understood they will be suitable to both parties.

In one of the contested cases, Michael Kinch, Alberton South, pleaded not guilty to a charge of unlawfully assaulting Fishery Officer J.H. Ballam by striking him in the leg with a wooden lobster crate, contrary to Sec. 231-1 (B) of the criminal code and amendments thereto.

Following evidence by Warden Thane Douglas, Frank Galant, Alberton South, who entered a plea of not guilty to possession of 46 undersized lobsters, was found guilty and fined \$23 and costs. He admitted the charge he was using to measure his catch was found to be a sixteenth of an inch shorter than the warden.

Ivan Rayner, Kildare pleaded guilty to possession of four berried (spawns) lobsters and 12 undersized lobsters and was fined \$12 and costs on each charge.

A Tignish fisherman, William J. Pitre, had a plea of guilty entered for him on a charge of possession of 29 undersized lobsters and was fined \$29 and costs.

The lobsters were found in a jacket in possession of the accused who was on his way home from the Tignish wharf area.

NOT GUILTY PLEAS
Myrl Matthews, Alberton South and Lorne Crockett, Alma, both pleaded not guilty to charges of possession of 28 cooked lobster tails for which the second abdominal segment measured less than 1 1/2 inches contrary to Section 3 (C) of the lobster fishery regulations.

Edward Millman, Alberton and George Kinch, Alberton South, each pleaded not guilty of fishing lobsters without first having obtained a license.

Other Alberton South fishermen pleading not guilty were Charles Fraser, Bryden Smith and John Gavin, each charged with possession of 10 undersized lobsters; Lemout Hutt, Everett Powers and James Gallant, charged with possession of 16, 21 and 34 lobsters respectively.

Tobacco Crop Planting Ended

The planting of some 115,000 tobacco plants on the farm of William Naddy, Greenfield, has been completed, Hon. Eugene Cullen, minister of agriculture, announced last night.

The 18-acre experimental tobacco plantation is located on the Sparrow Road about five miles from Montague and the two tons of tobacco plants flown to the province from Ontario are now seeded.

Agriculture Minister Cullen stated that planting began last Thursday and that checks made yesterday showed that less than three per cent of the plants failed to grow which shows that an excellent stand is in prospect.

The planting of the 18 acres of tobacco was under the supervision of veteran tobacco grower Ernest Leitch of Dorchester and the work was conducted by Roy Gibson, who was recommended by the Ontario Tobacco Growers to the provincial government.

It is understood that about 120 frost free days are desirable for the growing of tobacco and Mr. Cullen feels that the tobacco growing experiment in P.E.I. may be even more successful than the Nova Scotia experiment of last year.

Tobacco, Mr. Cullen explained, requires a sandy porous soil with a low nitrogen content and must always be grown on land that has been broken the previous season.

Lobster Carnival Program Is Nearing Completion

SUMMERSIDE — The central committee of the Summerside Lobster Carnival met for their weekly meeting in the RCAF Association rooms with the chairman Roy Johnston presiding.

Most of the plans for this year's expanded carnival have been finalized but for others, because of their nature, last minute decisions are necessary. Less than five weeks remain before the culminating point of the past years plans is reached and everything is laid on for smooth efficiency in this big operation.

46 floats will make up this year's mammoth parade in which six bands will provide the martial melodies as well as color. This huge parade has been divided into two sections and there will be prizes for the floats adjudged the best in the parade.

A new addition this year in regards to entertainment is a street dance to be held on the paved area in front of Bob Bank's Service Station at the intersection of Water and Notre Dame Streets. Firemen will be in town from all over the Maritimes, many with their families, and they are expected to add much to the gaiety of this year's carnival during which they are holding their Maritime tournament which is expected to draw large crowds.

Sixteen Canadian Legion branches have signified their intention to participate in the tug-of-war being supervised by the Summerside branch and prizes will be awarded to the winning branches.

A sketch of a large plaque to be donated by William Lynch, president of the Bill Lynch Shows to the best float in the parade was shown to the meeting as well as a diagram of the Stadium floor space and how it is being utilized for this year's carnival.

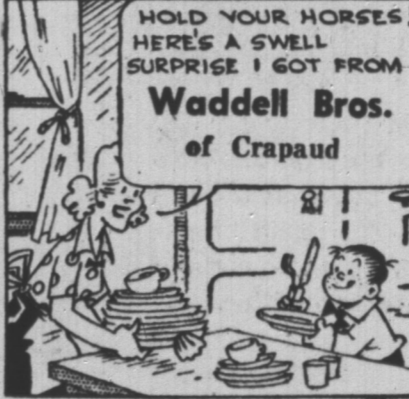
