NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Montreal Gazette: The Liberals of Beaulieu had their choice in selecting a candidate for Parliament, between a gentleman of unblemished record and Mr. Laurier. With the concurrence of Mr. Laurier, they selected Mr. Tarte.

In the opinion of the Kingston News the proceedings of Mr. Laurier's followers in the House of Commons can only be paralleled by those of the Home Rule party in the British Parliament, when it was found necessary to apply that very un-British check rein, the "closure."

But, as the Mail and Empire remarks, to compare the Canadian Liberals to the Irish Home Rulers is gross flattery of the former. The Irishmen were obstructionists with a policy, with the Canadian Liberals are obstructionist without one.

St. John Sun: Mr. Laurier's home organ still insists that the government is not trying to get the remedial bill through the house. It claims that the opposition and obstruction is chiefly carried on by conservatives such as McCarry and McNeill, Dr. Sproule and others.

The leader of the house seems to be doing all that is possible to free the party from responsibility for the obstructionists. Some even think that he has gone too far. But the French grit organs do not go to the trouble to tell their readers about these things.

Mr. Clarke Wallace claimed, during Saturday's proceedings in Parliament, that the Remedial Bill proposed to give more to the Manitoba Catholics in the matter of educational privileges than is enjoyed by the Quebec Protestants.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that if Mr. Wallace and other opponents of the Remedial Bill would compromise on a measure to give the Manitoba minority what the Quebec minority receives, there would be little complaint from the West. Quebec Protestants are permitted to pay their own school taxes to the support of their own schools, which are managed by their own trustees, and to share in the provincial educational grant. The same privileges will satisfy the Manitoba Catholics.

Power from the great dynamo of the Niagara Power Company will be transmitted to New York in about four hundred and sixty-two miles of wire on May 5th by the new Tesla system.

Holmes Death Roll.

New York, April 13.—The Journal this morning prints an alleged confession of H. H. Holmes, the murderer of Benjamin F. Pettee, in Philadelphia, who is under sentence to be hanged May 7. The confession takes up, with illustrations, three pages of the Journal. In it Holmes acknowledges the murder of twenty-one people, men, women and children. In a preface he declares that his crimes were only caused by the opportunity for pecuniary gain occasioned.
