THE Northern Light to-day brought Halifax and St. John dates of the 30th inst.

THE Parliament of Canada is summoned to meet on Thursday the 12th day of February.

MR. CHAPLEAU, Premier of Quebec, is tendered with a banquet, to take place at Montreal to-morrow.

THE lowest reading of the thermometer—between midnight and 10 o'clock to-day—was 8° below zero.

SENSIBLE TO THE LAST.—The snow storm last night was faithfully predicted in Chappelle's Almanac.

A LARGE shipment of goods, by Intercolonial express, arrived by "Northern Light" and train to-day.

THE COMING MAN.—The person who devoured one and a half dozen apples, for eighteen ate he. (Eighteen eighty.)

IN THE Northwest on Wed. day last, the thermometer registered fifty degrees below zero. Two persons are reported frozen to death.

AN intoxicated countryman last evening accosted the pump on the north side of Queen Square thusly: "Put down your club, darn yer, and I'll fight yer."

FRANCIS DOUCETTE appeared at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this (Wednesday)-morning, charged with assaulting Wm. Horne, on Christmas night. He was fined fifty cents and costs.

A NUMBER of prominent citizens in St. John, including the Mayor, were recently fined for allowing their sidewalks to be obstructed with snow. We suppose our people's time is coming.

HIS Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Haviland gave a grand ball at Government House last evening. The party was a large and brilliant one, and dancing was kept up with spirit till about two o'clock this morning.

FURIOUS driving through our streets, especially on market days, is becoming too prevalent. The police seem to take little if any notice to this violation of the law. Often horses, minus the bells, appear on the streets without "let or hindrance."

NEXT to Victoria Bridge over the St. Lawrence at Montreal, the Bridge of Tay—the scene of the recent terrible disaster—was the largest railway bridge in the world. It was within a fraction of two miles long, having 85 spans, eleven of which were 245 feet each! The accident is the most disastrous and fatal railway accident on record.
