On Saturday afternoon, a man working on the Magnetic Railroad at Brownville, dropped dead. He was shoveling sand and smoking; he pitched forward, gasped one or twice, and before the men working right beside him could lift him, he was dead. He belonged to Prince Edward Island. He was buried Sunday. His death was supposed to be caused by heart disease. No inquest was held.—St. John Telegraph.

ONE of the crew of the A. R. Crittendon, of Gloucester, Mass., was drowned on 30th inst., about noon, eight or nine miles south of East Point. His name was John McKay, and he belonged to Sand Point, Canada. He was lost through the capsizing of the seine boat. The crew were setting the seine for a school of mackerel, when the stern painter got caught, capsizing the seine boat and throwing its occupants overboard. All succeeded in getting into the boat again except poor McKay, who was drowned.

AS Ottawa despatch reports: "Hon. Mr. Foster has been long in settling the case of the first officer of the cruiser Vigilant, who got drunk in Souris, P. E. I., on Friday night last, disgracing the uniform he wore and being made the butt and laughing stock of the American fishermen in port. He has been dismissed from the service, the reputation of which Mr. Foster seems bound to maintain. The whole of Prince Edward Island is nominally under the Scott Act, but it seems easy enough to get drunk in any part of the Island."

Says the Cape Ann Advertiser: Our correspondent says that the fuddled lieutenant of the Vigilant attempted to fire a green log for the sunset gun. Next day Capt. McLean, of the Vigilant, went the rounds and gave orders that no man go up town after sunset.
