## THE DOUKHOBORS.

Seventeen Cases of Smallpox, but All Progressing Nicely.

QUEBEC, Que., June 25.—There are now seventeen cases of smallpox at Grosse Ile, eleven among the Doukhobors and six among the crew of the Lake Huron. All are doing well, and if the present state of affairs continues, the whole party will be allowed to proceed on June 28th. Two deaths have occurred, one from dysentery, and the other from old age, deceased being a woman of 98 years. On Sunday, Monday and Tuesday last the Doukhobors celebrated the Feast of Tabernacles. They were decked in their holiday attire and presented a most picturesque appearance. The funeral ceremonies are of a unique nature. All the relatives of the deceased are drawn up in two lines, one composed of men and the other of women. They sing hymns, while the men shake hands and bow to each other in turns, and the women do likewise. Then the men embrace one another and the women follow suit, and all march up and condole with the head of the family. The ceremony takes up at least an hour.

One of the Doukhobors is over 100 years of age and bears up well, though the trip has fatigued him very much. There are several cases of dysentery among the older women, some of which may prove fatal. The men have been scooping out bathing along the rocky shore. The new immigrants have a peculiar dislike to crosses, which they abhor as the instrument of torture of Our Lord. They objected to the tickets put on their clothing because there was a red cross on each ticket.

## BUTLER STOCK COMPANY

A Dramatic Organization of Merit  
Now at the Opera House.

The W. J. Butler Stock Co., which opened a week's engagement at the Opera House last night in Hazel Kirke, should not be confounded with the ordinary ten, twenty and thirty cent companies that have been inflicted on this city. It occupies a higher plane. Mr. Butler is an actor of merit, with leanings to the good old school and he has surrounded himself with men who in winter time fill responsible positions on the American stage. Eschewing the modern society and farce comedy plays, he presents a series of legitimate dramas that should appeal to the veteran theatre goers.

Hazel Kirke, last night, drew a good house, that applauded the performance with judicious measure. A curtain call followed the first act, and Mr. Butler was compelled to respond to several demands as the play progressed. In appearance and dialect he was the typical North of England miller and in the scene where he curses his daughter, Mr. Butler displayed a dramatic fire that took the house by storm. Mr. Terry, as Patacus Green, in voice and action reminded his hearers of W. H. Lytell, than whom no better comedian is known in St. John. He is easy graceful polished and knows how to speak the English language. Mr. Chappelle as Arthur Rodney was capital, but Mr. Clarendon as Ashur Carrington (Lord Travers) appeared to be out of his element. English lords, as a rule, remove their hats when in the presence of ladies. Miss Henrietta Brown as the miller's daughter gave evidence of a clear conception of the author's idea and her work indicated the possession of gifts that fit her for more emotional roles. Miss Emma Lathrop was a very acceptable Mercy Kirke and Lady Travers and the balance of the cast was good. There is something odd about Hazel Kirke as a dramatic production. Squire Rodney clears up the situation in the first act and yet works to the finale without apparently knowing that he has unravelled the plot in advance.

The specialties between the acts were very good. Harry Mayo sang his popular composition, "The Singer in the Gallery" so as to get an enthusiastic encore, and John S. Terry and Mabel Lambest were applauded to the echo. Mr. Terry is a phenomenal singer, who would take a high place on the concert stage.

A better pleased audience has seldom left the Opera House. Tonight, All a Mistake, will be presented with a fine cast. St. John Sun, June 20: The above company opens a week's engagement at the Masonic Opera House on Thursday, July 6th.

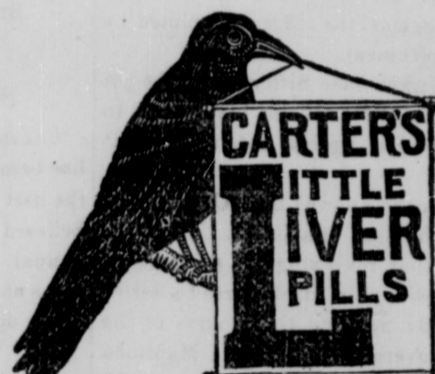
