The failure of the Fishery off the coast of Gaspe has reduced the fishing population to the verge of starvation, and renders outside assistance imperative.

In South Africa the Basutos are threatening a general massacre of the whites and a message has been received at Cape Town asking that all available troops be sent to the front.

The sum of \$1,500 was realized in aid of the building fund of the new Convent at Picton, by a bazaar, held last week. The proceeds are said to be the largest in the history of Picton County entertainments.

82ND BATTALION, No. 3 (Captain Longworth's) Company, with the Band of the 82nd Battalion, are requested to parade, in review order—officers in undress—in the Drill Shed, on Friday evening next, the 1st prox., at 7.30 o'clock, to receive their annual pay, and to resume their weekly company drills.

JOHN McCABE and James Doolan appeared at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, charged with using abusive language towards Francis Keenan. Doolan was dismissed, and McCabe was fined \$2 and costs. The case of Patrick Smith vs. Henry Lawson, for criminal libel, was postponed until the 11th of October.

BERNARD McAREE, truckman, was brutally assaulted by Edward Gahan, on King Street, on Wednesday evening. Gahan, without any cause whatever, dealt him a blow of a heavy whip handle, which caused a severe fracture to Mr. McAree's skull. Assaults such as this, on inoffensive men, should be rigidly punished.

SUDDEN DEATHS AT BRIDGEWATER, N. S.—A despatch to the St. John Telegraph under date of Bridgewater, 28th September, says: A young man near Bridgewater, while engaged in sinking rocks, was caught between the stones and crushed to death. Mr. E. Rheinhardt, Sub-Collector of Customs at La Have, died suddenly last night while presiding at the annual school meeting.

DR. R. McNEILL, of Stanley Bridge, has in his garden a fine growth of sugar cane, of a peculiar variety adapted to our comparatively cool climate. The writer examined a specimen, which was about four feet long, and appeared to be well grown and juicy. It seems that between sugar cane and sugar beet, our Island might yet become a noted sugar growing country.—*Com. to Summerside Pioneer.*

A BUNDLE of yesterday's issue of the EXAMINER, addressed to our country subscribers, was stolen from the Post Office yesterday evening. A small number of the papers were to-day found in the possession of a discharged newsboy named Whitlock, who made a "clean breast of it," and gave full particulars how another discharged newsboy named Furray committed the theft, sold the papers and purchased fishing gear. The young thief will in due time receive proper punishment.

WANTON DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY.—One night last week, some evil-disposed persons cut the cables, sails and rigging, and stole the anchors of ten or a dozen of the boats occupied in fishing oysters in Richmond Bay. Many of the boats went adrift, and were with difficulty recovered. It is hard to conceive who the parties were or what motive led them to such conduct. It is, however, dangerous pastime, and reminds one of the deeds of darkness perpetrated at North River two or three years ago. The punishment these fiends are now enduring for destroying the property of worthy and unoffensive citizens, should teach others that, notwithstanding even the cover of darkness, villainous deeds will be traced out and their perpetrators duly punished. Those who the other day took pleasure in destroying the property of industrious, hard-working fishermen, will, we trust, be brought to justice and be rewarded according to the utmost rigor of the law.—*Pioneer.*

THE TURF.—Mr. James Dover's mare Lady Bagnall and Mr. Archd. Holmes' Lookout did good trotting at Kentville on the 28th inst. A telegram to the Halifax Herald says: In the first race four horses started—Mr. Dover's Lady Bagnall, Mr. N. Lea's All Right, of Summerside, Harry Baker and Wormwood. The first heat was won by Lady Bagnall. Time, 2.45. Wormwood 2nd; Harry Baker 3rd. All Right, for running, was sent back to 4th place. In the 2nd heat Lady Bagnall won, Wormwood 2nd, Baker 3rd, All Right being sent back to 4th place for running. Time 2.46. In the third heat Lady Bagnall again won, with Wormwood 2nd and Baker 3rd—the positions of the other horses being the same. Time 2.47. Both Lady Bagnall and Wormwood did some fine trotting and behaved splendidly. The third race, or "2.38 class," was the fastest ever trotted on the track. Three horses competed—Dutchman, Empress and Mr. Holmes' Lookout. The first heat was won by Dutchman by a head, in 2.37, with Lookout second, and Empress a bad third. The second heat was also concluded in the same order—time 2.38. The third heat left the record the same as it was before, the Judge pronouncing it no heat, owing to conflicting accounts as to the behavior of the horses. The race will be finished at two o'clock to-morrow (29th) afternoon. A close contest is expected.

Mr. A. N. Large, of this city, has entered his b. s. Messenger Boy for the races at Moosepath in the three minute, 2.38 and 2.45 classes. Mr. A. Holmes' Lookout is entered in the 2.38 and free-for-all classes, and Mr. James Dover's Lady Bagnall is entered in the three-minute and 2.45 classes. The horses are all in good condition, and will no doubt give good accounts of themselves.

Mr. A. N. Large's horse "Little Fred," after winning second money in race at Montreal was sold for the handsome sum of \$1,200.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

**CANADIAN.**  
OTTAWA, Sept. 28.  
A Cabinet meeting was held this afternoon. It is understood the subject of an early session of Parliament was discussed, but what decision if any was arrived at is not made known.  
The Governor General is expected to arrive early in October, when Syndicate arrangement in detail will be submitted to him.  
Now that the Premier has arrived speculation as to probable Cabinet changes is again rife, and already rumor is busy with certain names. One of the latest, is that Mr. Caron, M. P., will be sworn in as a Cabinet Minister at an early date.

**EUROPEAN.**  
LONDON, Sept. 28.  
Parnell has left New Ross for Dublin to hold a special meeting of the executive committee of the Land League, at which a scheme for obtaining more detailed information in regard to the management of estates will be discussed. Parnell states that he does not fear any prosecution against the speakers of the Land League, as they would be abortive. Illegal drilling continues.

A correspondent of the Times, Dublin, says: "The murder of Lord Mountmorres excited feelings of alarm little short of a panic among all respectable classes. Party differences are for the time discarded in presence of common imminent danger. Press Association is informed that, in view of affairs in Ireland and in the East, influential supporters of the Government are urging convocation of Parliament in November."  
Cork Nationalists have declined to participate in the Parnell demonstration.  
The Bishop of Liverpool was stoned by an Irish mob last night.

**RAGUSA, Sept. 28.**  
It is questioned whether the landing of troops from the fleet would assist the Montenegrins in the occupation of Dulcigno.

It is rumored that the Albanians at Scutari have prevented foreign consuls from leaving that town.  
The French commander has declined active participation in hostilities.

**CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 28.**  
The Ambassadors' reply to the Porte's circular on the Montenegrin question has been delivered to the Porte. The reply declines to grant more time or abandon the demonstration.

**GIAVOSA, Sept. 28.**  
A battalion of Turkish regulars has been observed in Dulcigno itself.

**PARIS, Sept. 28.**  
Newspapers of various shades openly condemn participation by France in naval demonstration.

**LONDON, Sept. 28.**  
"St. James Gazette" publishes the following Berlin despatch: "Powers have peremptorily demanded of Sultan immediate recall of Riza Pasha and surrender of Dulcigno."

**BERLIN, Sept. 28.**  
The strike which began recently with the carpenters extended to the tanners, weavers and other workmen, and is assuming a serious phase.

**LONDON, Sept. 28.**  
Empress Eugenie has purchased Fernborough Hall estate in Hampshire, paying therefor £50,000.

**RAGUSA, Sept. 28.**  
A correspondent of the Manchester Guardian telegraphs that Prince Montenegro, in a letter to Admiral Seymour, professes continued willingness to advance on Dulcigno if he can first obtain an European guarantee of ulterior assistance on land against Turkish forces.

**AFGHANISTAN.**  
CALCUTTA, Sept. 28.  
The latest advices from Cabul are that officers and men of the Cabooli regiments of Ayoub Khan's defeated army have reached Cabul and submitted to the Ameer.

**UNITED STATES.**  
NEW YORK, Sept. 28.  
It is stated that it is probable that a French fleet and regiment of infantry will take part in Yorktown celebration.

**CLEVELAND, Sept. 28.**  
Generals Grant and Logan arrived from Chicago this morning, on their way to the Republican mass meeting at Warren, Ohio. Efforts are being made to have Grant and Conkling at a meeting here to-morrow night.

**NEW YORK, Sept. 28.**  
Epizootic has appeared in stables of the Twenty-third and Third avenue stage line in a mild form.

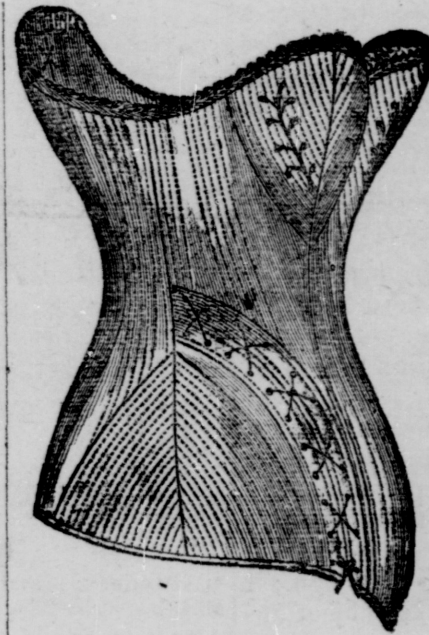
