RCAF Housing Project Gets Mixed Reception

SUMMERSIDE — An announcement from Ottawa yesterday that the 175 housing units planned for RCAF personnel would be built in Slemmon Park was received with something less than enthusiasm by some Town officials here.

Mayor J.E. Morrison termed it "a slap in the face to the Town of Summerside," and felt the decision would be a great disappointment to the whole Town.

On the other hand Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaught, who made the announcement, said that the department of national defence felt the air force personnel involved would be "happier" living in their own area, on land owned by the defence department.

tax might raise increasing international doubts about U.S. economic strength, setting off a possible large-scale flight of foreign capital from the U.S.

"Not only will we fail to encourage more foreign investment in U.S. securities, but we run the risk of inducing liquidation of present foreign holders of U.S. securities," said I. W. Burnham, senior partner of Burnham and Company, members of the New York Stock Exchange.

The International Nickel Company of Canada urged that all outstanding shares of Canadian companies listed and traded on U.S. exchanges be excluded from the tax.

Henry S. Wingate, president of the American-controlled company, said this would be a major step in reducing differences between the Canadian and U.S. administrations which developed following announcement of the tax proposal. The U.S. has already agreed to exempt new Canadian issues from the tax on the understanding that the Canadians would want to record recurrence of recent debt borrowing in the New York market.

In any case, said Wingate, the exemption should be extended to include the shares of International Nickel, Aluminite Limited of Montreal and similar U.S.-controlled companies, owned to the extent of at least 50 per cent by American investors and whose shares are traded in the U.S.

Sentence Against Accused Is Conditionally Deferred

SUMMERSIDE — An unusually light docket was presented before Magistrate W. Chester MacDonald in Prince County magistrates' court yesterday morning.

Sheldon Ralph Laird, formerly of Summerside, was given a circumstantial deferred sentence to Cst. 1 for failing to meet the conditions handed down by the court when given a suspended sentence two months ago after he had entered a plea of guilty to a charge of having possession of stolen goods.

Magistrate MacDonald ordered Laird to refrain from alcoholic beverages; take a job he has been offered and not leave it until given permission by the court; contribute at least \$25 every week he is employed to his wife and family; keep the peace and be of good behaviour; and enter into a personal recognizance of \$1,000.
