

Assistance By Business Heavy To Education

MONTREAL (CP)—Canadian business gives more annually to education than any other charitable cause, including social services, the National Conference Board says.

Reporting on a study of contributions by 177 Canadian companies in 1965, the board says 46.1 per cent of the \$25,600,000 they gave went to educational institutions, nearly all of it marked for universities.

Gifts to health and welfare drives—such as United Appeals, took up 40.5 per cent of total donations.

The board gives no comparisons with previous years but says that gifts to social service programs have not decreased in recent years.

Instead, universities have become the principal beneficiaries of bigger over-all contributions.

"We have quite consciously increased our support for edu-

ational appeals and have held the line or reduced our support in other directions," a pulp and paper company told the board in response to a mailed questionnaire.

"While we have not reduced our support for health and welfare campaigns in the communities where we have a vital interest, we have become much more selective and we are less likely than we were to respond to campaigns in other areas of Canada."

Of the remaining total of the charitable gifts, 6.8 per cent was for civic causes, 14 per cent for cultural matters and the rest for assorted campaigns.

Capital projects are the biggest recipients of corporate giving, reflecting at least in part the surge in university construction during recent years.

About 31 cents of each gift dollar goes to a university build-

Mining Upsurge Expected

VANCOUVER (CP)—British Columbia speculators are poised for an anticipated break-out of mining activity on the Vancouver Stock Exchange early in 1967.

The boom should be on in about a month, John Van Loven, president of the exchange, said in an interview.

He said the present situation is comparable to that preceding the boom in the fall of 1965, when news of Pine Point and other discoveries started a strong speculative surge. At the peak of the activity, in November, 1965, trading on one day hit a record 6,500,000 shares.

"Several companies are on the verge of announcements," he said.

They were expected to state development plans earlier, he said, but a late freeze-up in north and interior B.C. delayed exploration and development programs.

Thomas Elliott, manager of the B.C. and Yukon Chamber of Mines, said he feels next year's activity will be concentrated on copper and molybdenum.

FIRM EYES MERCURY

He said one American firm, based in Texas, which has substantial gas interests, wants to enter the Cimarron mining field, which could boost what has been only limited activity in the production of mercury there.

"Exploration is going to be as good as it has been," he said. "There is only a slight possibility of slackening."

He said: "B.C. is a very highly mineralized part of the world and is drawing attention because of the copper and molybdenum potential. These large companies like the mineral climate here."

He said both federal and provincial government attitudes toward mining are encouraging, as evidenced by the absence of capital gains tax and three-year corporate tax exemptions for newly established mines.

New Canadian Constitution Urged As 1967 Aim By Dief

OTTAWA (CP)—A "made-in-Canada" constitution should be adopted in 1967 to strengthen the bonds that unite Canadians, Opposition Leader Diefenbaker says in his New Year's message.

"He renews his proposal for a national conference to revise and 'repeal' the British North America Act of 1867.

"No time is more appropriate than 1967 for such a great national conference. I believe it would be crowned with success, for Canadians generally are desirous now, in a spirit of amity and tolerance, to bring about changes in the constitution which, in the light of the experience of a century, should be made."

Mr. Diefenbaker's statement calls for a method of amending the constitution without recourse to the British Parliament.

"The bonds that bind this nation in Confederation would be vastly strengthened by a re-definition of national goals, by a declaration of national purpose and by the adoption of a

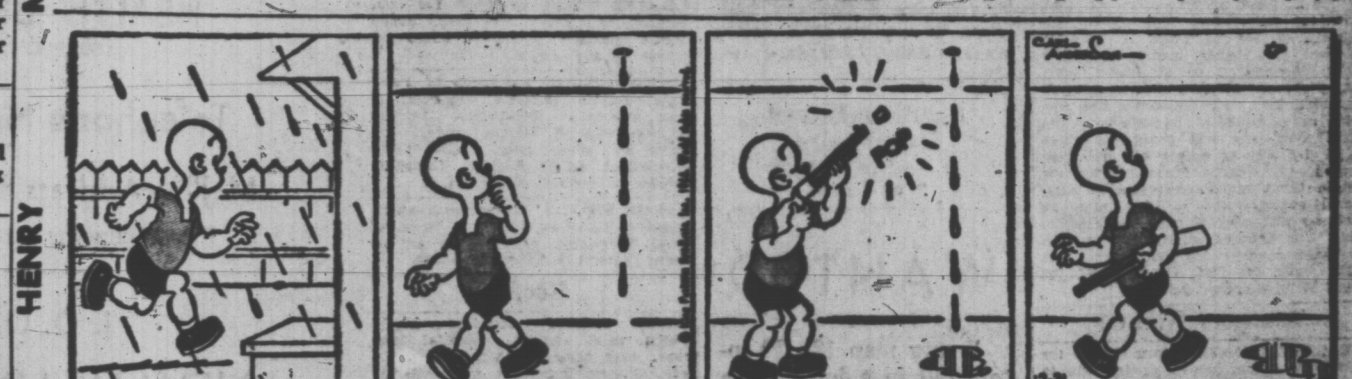
