List of Judgments Delivered by the Supreme Court.

OTTAWA, June 6.—The first thing that happened when the House met yesterday was the production and reading by the Premier of the Alaska and Yukon boundary protocol.

The statement read by him is the same as was presented last week by the Imperial Government and printed in Canadian papers on Monday morning.

Other business in the House was unimportant.

The following judgments were delivered in the Supreme Court:

Burns vs. Rhind; appeal dismissed with costs.

Zwicker vs. Zwicker; appeal allowed with costs and action dismissed with costs. Zwicker vs. Fandel; appeal allowed with costs.

Atlas Insurance Company vs. Brownell; appeal allowed with costs and action dismissed with cost.

Williams vs. Bantling; appeal dismissed with costs. Gwynne, J. dissenting.

Commercial Union Assurance vs. Margeson; appeal allowed with costs, action dismissed with costs.

LONDON, June 6.—At the close of play yesterday in the match between the Marylebone Cricket Club and the Australian eleven the former secured 245 runs and the Australians had 110 runs to their credit for one wicket down.

MRS. MAYBRICK MAY BE FREED

London Chronicle Announces This Result May Follow Ambassador Choate's Efforts.

LONDON, June 5.—The Daily Chronicle announces that Mrs. Florence Maybrick is likely to be liberated shortly, the result of the pressure brought to bear by Joseph Choate, United States ambassador, in favor of reopening the case. Baroness de Reque, mother of Mrs. Maybrick, recently declared that her daughter would be released in July. This statement was endorsed by legal advisers of Mrs. Maybrick's friends. The prisoner was removed last month from the hard labor to which she was assigned when she entered upon her sentence ten years ago, and has improved in health, although she is still quite frail. The case of Mrs. Maybrick has recently been brought to the notice of Queen Victoria, and it has been intimated that she was disposed to grant a pardon.

SPANISH SITUATION

A Sorrowful Queen—Spain Parts With her Remnants.

MADRID, June 4.—The Queen Regent today opened the Cortes with the usual ceremonial, and the speech from the throne announced that the Marianne, Caroline and Palao Islands were ceded to Germany by the Spanish Cabinet. During the course of the speech, Her Majesty said: "At the opening of the Cortes all the sorrows which have wrenched our hearts, through the disasters which have visited our country, are reawakened. We must preserve sadness in order to derive experience therefrom, but the woes of our country are of such nature that reticence and silence avail better than complaints. When peace with the United States was concluded parliamentary troubles caused a change of cabinet, and the present cabinet was formed. Under the constitution it belonged to me to ratify the treaty by laying it before the Chamber. There remained under our control the Carolinas, Palao and most of the Mariana Islands. But the former cabinet believed it useless for Spain to retain such minor appendages of our ancient empire and signed with the German Emperor a convention offering to cede those territories under the law, which will be submitted immediately to the Chamber.

"Our foreign relations are cordial and friendly. We specially owe to the Pope recognition of the many times he has given us his moral support.

"The most important, most urgent and most difficult task before you is to balance the budget and liquidate the debt resulting from the war through ordinary and permanent sources of income. Thanks to the severely economic policy projected, the Government will not ask fresh sacrifices of the country, except such as can be equitably divided among all classes.

"With the ordinary budget will also be presented schemes to liquidate the charges created by the loss of possessions and colonial campaigns."

The Queen Regent then referred to the financial measures and expressed confidence that the nation would show the same resignation during peace as it showed during the war, adding: "For the times are critical and it is impossible during the present session to do all that is necessary. But during the next session there will be projects for the reorganization of the army and navy, based on obligatory service; for improving the public services, decentralizing and reforming the penal code and electoral laws, etc."

A New Proposition.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—A new proposition, designed to effect a temporary arrangement for the present serious difficulty over the Alaska boundary dispute, has been advanced by the United States. In effect, the United States suggest a modus vivendi, which contemplates the restriction of British and American soldiers and police to certain prescribed territory. It is not intended by this Government that a neutral zone shall be established, nor will the United States attempt to arrange a temporary boundary line. The proposal of this Government is intended merely to bring about an arrangement which will prevent bloodshed along the disputed border line, where the feeling between the British and American settlers is very high.

It was established when the negotiations on the subject came to an end about two weeks ago, that it would be impossible to make an agreement with Great Britain for the settlement of the dispute by arbitration. The deadlock on the arbitration proposition was caused by the attitude of Canada, which has dominated Great Britain in all the proceedings. The new proposal of the United States is intended to remain in effect only until the two Governments can reach some agreement for the settlement of the entire question.

THE JOINT CONFERENCE.

Less Powerful States Will Probably Nullify its Labors.

BERLIN, June 4.—The Cologne Gazette, commenting on the Peace Conference, says: "The correct attitude of Russia in furthering the aims of the conference is generally recognized, but the attitude of a majority of the less powerful states tends to nullify its labors. They display a desire for an ideal condition of things, under which differences in the relative strength of nations would disappear. If, for instance as we believe, recently happened, great powers, with such varied interests as Germany, Austria-Hungary, France and the United States find themselves together in a minority, it is unnecessary to be a prophet to say that in such a case, a resolution of the majority must remain a dead letter."

At the Hague.

THE HAGUE, June 2.—The Geneva convention section of the Committee on the Laws of War has established new rules for the protection and care of the wounded at sea.

The special commission to which projects have been referred has decided unanimously to discard all projects not coming directly within the precise aim of the conference.

The third commission has finished the work treating upon good offices and mediation. It has welded the various projects into one, which will be submitted for discussion on Monday. When the decision is concluded the commission will resume their examination, drafting a single arbitration scheme based on the various projects submitted.

Russia has lodged a complaint with the Porte against the Turkish delegates to the Peace Conference at The Hague. It is claimed that they do not possess definite instructions, thus rendering their co-operation in the work of the conference difficult.

Marchand in Paris.

PARIS, June 4.—Among the persons who were arrested for disorderly conduct during the demonstration in honor of Major Marchand, were fifty who had cried, "Down with England!" They will be prosecuted in the police Courts. Though excitement is high, and many brawlers are in detention, things are fairly quiet. The members of the Marchand mission are now the guests of the Colonial Minister M. Guillain, and his reception in their honor was really a brilliant function.

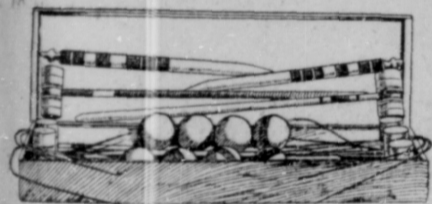
