PSYCHIC DOUBLES

Some experts occasionally make psychic doubles of slam bids for the sole purpose of "misplacing" cards for the declarer, but obviously, this sort of action is not very safe! Observe the following case:

North dealer.
Both sides vulnerable.

♠ 10 8 8 6	♠ K 10 4	♠ Q 7 5 3
♥ 3	♥ A J 5	♥ Q 4 2
♦ J 10 8 7	♦ K Q	♦ 9 6 5 3 2
♣ J 6 2	♣ A K 9 7 3	♣ A

The bidding:
North East South West
1♣ Pass 1♠ Pass
2NT Pass 3♣ Pass
3♦ Pass 4♦ Pass
4♥ Pass 5♥ (!) Pass
6♠ Pass 6♠ Dbl. (!) Pass
Pass Pass Redbl. Pass

In all probability, West thought that the multitudinous bids made by the opponents was evidence that they did not know just where they were headed, but the fact is that each and every bid was entirely logical, and "constructive". From the moment South heard his partner's rebid if two notrump the only question in his mind was whether a grand slam would be safe—a small slam was a foregone conclusion! South realized that North might have a magnificent holding, and yet that the partnership might lack the queen, or even possibly the king of spades, and the absence of either of those cards would jeopardize a thirteen-trick contract.

Perhaps, however, West was not misled; perhaps his double of six spades was merely motivated by the hope of "misplacing" whatever spades South was missing. Perhaps West felt that his own spade void indicated considerable length in his partner's hand. Whatever West's reasoning was, however, his double, leading to South's redouble, was extremely costly! South knew very well that West would not have doubled if he had held the spade queen—he would not have revealed that card—in the play, South led a low spade from his own hand and when West's void was exposed, thirteen tricks became a laydown, for the astronomical score of 2420 points!
