## Local and Other Items.

**THE PROBS.**—Fine, not much change in temperature.

**CONNECTED.**—The office and store of Shaw Beirsto, plumbers, has been connected by telephone.

**THE MAY QUEEN.**—This steamer left here for Picton on Saturday but had to return on account of the ice.

**THE ELLIOTT.**—The steamer Elliott left on Saturday evening for New York. She has been chartered for the fruit service.

**LOBSTERS.**—Lobsters were caught at Cance Cove on Saturday by the men of the Portland Packing Company's factory.

**THE NORTHUMBERLAND.**—The Northumberland will not move out until further notice. The report from Picton today is that there is considerable ice between Cariboo Channel and the east end of Picton Island.

**POLICE COURT.**—This forenoon further evidence was heard in the prosecution against Frank Murphy, for forgery. Several witnesses were examined after which the prisoner was charged and pleaded "Not Guilty" whereupon he was remanded for trial in the Supreme Court.

**CHANGE OF TIME TABLE.**—The spring arrangement of the Prince Edward Island Railway went into effect to-day. The train for the west now leaves every morning at 7.30 local instead of 8 o'clock, and the train from the west is due at a quarter to eleven instead of twenty minutes past.

**PATRONAGE OF ST. JOSEPH.**—Yesterday being the Feast of the Patronage of St. Joseph it was celebrated by St. Joseph's Sodality in the usual manner. At the evening service in the chapel of St. Joseph's Convent, Rev. P. C. Gauthier delivered an able address. The altar decorations were exceedingly pretty and tasteful.

**WOMEN'S COUNCIL.**—At the meeting on Saturday afternoon, the petition asking the Legislature to amend the School Act that women may be eligible for election as members of the School Board was adopted and ordered to be forwarded in the hope that the House may take favorable action this session. A committee was appointed to enquire into the needs of a home for the aged poor. A vote of thanks was tendered Miss Pippy for her gift to the labor bureau of a handsome register book.

**FIRE AT FRENCH FORT.**—Mr. Wallace Owen, of French Fort, has suffered a severe loss by fire. Last night when he was away at church his barn was burned, and fifteen cows, ten pigs, seed grain, thresher and fanners, and all his implements, were destroyed. No one was home at the time but a little boy, and he discovered the fire on opening the barn door when he went to feed the cattle about half past six o'clock. There was only \$200 insurance on the building.

E. Island to Klondike, till we have become a reproach and by-word before the civilized nations of the earth today. God requires righteousness in the rulers of nations today as much as he did thousands of years ago, and if the people of this country expect to prosper by exalting any but righteous men to rule; they will surely be disappointed as they are at this time. The cause of this humiliation is not far to seek; for those who have eyes to see. Sampson placed confidence in Delilah, and was shorn of his strength and delivered into the hands of his enemies, to have his eyes put out, that he might be their sport. **THE STANLEY.**—The Stanley is making the round trip to-day. She arrived here on Saturday at six o'clock.

**H. B. C.**—Postponed meeting of Hillsborough Boating Club will be held this evening at 7.45. All members please attend.

**JACQUES CARTIER.**—The steamer Jacques Cartier made the round trip between Charlottetown and Crapaud on Saturday, returning about six in the evening.

**TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE.**—The meeting on Saturday evening was devoted to the transaction of general business. Reports of committees were received and the finances of the Association received some attention.

**TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.**—There was a fair attendance at the meeting on Saturday evening, and a profitable hour was spent in discussing "Memory in Education," dealing chiefly with Retention and Reproduction.

**THE PRINCESS.**—The Princess, which left Charlottetown at six o'clock on Saturday did not get into Picton until late in the afternoon. She returned to Charlottetown yesterday afternoon, with a full cargo and 50 bags of mail matter. This morning she left for Picton where she arrived at 11 o'clock. She will return to-morrow forenoon.

**HOMER FOR INTERMENT.**—The body of the late Edwin P. Robins, who died at Ithaca, N. Y., last week, arriving in Charlottetown on Saturday evening, and was this morning forwarded to Bedegon, where the funeral will take place on Wednesday next at 3 o'clock. A class-mate, Mr. W. S. Ferguson, accompanied the body to Boston, where it was received by Mr. Earle Robins, a brother of the deceased, who brought it home. The floral contributions included beautiful wreaths from the Professors of Cornell, the classmates of the deceased, and the Canadian Club.

**ENTERTAINMENT IN A CHURCH.**—Mr. M. J. Keating, the energetic press manager of Keith's Boston Theatre, has branched out in a new role. On Thursday evening last, in the Third Universalist Church, Somerville, Mass., he gave an interesting and instructive lecture on the topic, "The Benefits of Amusements," which was followed by a vaudeville entertainment the performers all being from Keith's Theatre. Mr. Keating, in the course of his address, pointed out that the stage is helpful when it shows life as it really is through such plays as "The Little Minister," "Old Homestead," "Shore Acres," and others on the dramatic stage, and the majority of acts in the vaudeville. Properly regulated amusement, said he, is helpful because it does not interfere with business, the home life, education or virtue, but, on the contrary, advances them all. It helps in the temperance cause, too, for a man cannot be in a saloon and the playhouse at the same time; hence it must tend to sobriety, and that means happier homes and larger church attendance. As an educational factor the stage has been of almost incalculable value. Immortal plays were not so numerous as most people thought; the trouble was that one of them attracted more attention and caused more comment than 100 good ones. A bad play was advertised by ministers, critics and every one who attacked it. If they all left the bad play alone it would die quickly—fall because of lack of advertising. Spraying of the vaudeville form of entertainment, which he said he knew more about than any other, Mr. Keating claimed that good clean vaudeville, such as is always found at Keith's, is the sun and salt of good fun that causes doctors to advise their patients to go and give their over-worked husbands. The entertainment was of an unusual character for a church, and was greatly appreciated by the large audience.
