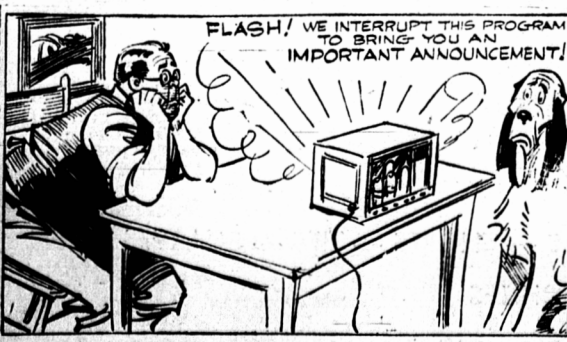
TOWN OF SOURIS

Supreme Court To Try Accused In Cattle Case

Three men charged with cattle stealing at St. Peter's, were sent to the Supreme Court for trial as their preliminary hearing concluded at Georgetown yesterday. They are George MacKay and his brother, Charles MacKay of Georgetown, N.B. and Bernard Christensen of Bass River, N.S.

The hearing was before Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph W. MacDonald and had been in progress since last week.

The men were arrested at St. Peter's by R.C.M.P. on the morning of Dec. 8 and charged with the theft of five calves from Chester C. Pratt, St. Peter's, valued at \$300.

Only evidence yesterday was cross examination by the Crown of Charles MacKay, who had completed his direct examination when the hearing adjourned on Friday. He was the last of the three accused to give evidence.

Under cross examination he told of leaving Sturgeon, P.E.I. at about 6:30 p.m. on Dec. 7 for Brudenell, dropping off Christensen at Montague. The witness said he then proceeded to pick up cattle which were purchased, and Christensen did the same.

When they arrived at St. Peter's they left Christensen's truck at the stock pen, with six calves on it. They then proceeded to Souris where they unloaded cattle on the witness' truck. They went to their hotel at 10 p.m. and got up at 5:50 a.m. on Friday (the day they were arrested).

Truck In Same Place

The witness said he started for St. Peter's after breakfast and arrived there at 7 a.m. He told of getting hammer and saw for making partitions in the car. When he arrived at the railway station Christensen's truck was in the same place they had left it the night previous.

Shortly after the witness arrived, his brother George and Christensen came. They had travelled together from Souris.

The witness noticed some calves out of the stock pen and corroborated evidence of the other accused concerning the turning loose of four they thought did not belong to them when they rounded up those that were running loose.

He told of Mr. Pratt getting five calves he identified as his from the car. The witness said the car should have contained 26 sheep when shipped but the railway count at Moncton indicated only 25.

Comments by Counsel

Mr. D.L. Mathieson, K.C. of Charlottetown, who represented the accused summed up the case. He contended that on the facts of the case the Magistrate would be justified in discharging the three accused. He said that it was unusual in cases of preliminary hearing for the accused to take the stand and also that the Crown had no right to cross examination in a preliminary inquiry.

He reviewed the evidence and contended that no guilt existed and that it was a perfectly proper case for dismissal under the Criminal Code.

Mr. S.S. Hessian, K.C. Crown prosecutor for King's County, said that the defence had asked for the preliminary inquiry and that the Crown did not deny them any rights from the time of the arrest to the present. Many of the contentions of Mr. Mathieson were quite true, he said, if Mr. Mathieson had allowed the Magistrate to sit on the case as a summary trial. But this was not a summary trial. The verdict guilty or not guilty should be left to the Court the defence asked for, and he asked that the usual procedure be followed and the men put on their trial.

The Magistrate then committed the three men for trial at the next sitting of the Supreme Court in Georgetown.

Ball already arranged was permitted to continue, \$1,200 for George MacKay and \$1,000 each for Charles MacKay and Bernard Christensen.
