BLACK DIAMOND LINE.—The SS. Coban will leave Montreal on Thursday, 10th inst., due here on Sunday, 13th inst., and will call for St. John's Nfld., via Sydney, on Monday, 14th inst.

THE ELLIOTT.—The SS. Elliott arrived in Savannah from Bluefields on Saturday last—having made the round trip in seventeen days—the quickest trip yet. All on board reported well.

THE FLORIDA.—The steamer Florida, of the new Plant Line, which is to run between Boston and Charlottetown direct, left Boston for this port yesterday at noon, and is due here to-morrow evening. She is expected to return to Boston on Friday evening.

SCOTT ACT.—Yesterday afternoon Henry Hooper, living on the Rowley, appeared before H. V. Palmer and Samuel McEae, J. P.'s, on two charges of violation of the Canada Temperance Act. Several witnesses were examined, and for want of sufficient evidence the two cases were dismissed with costs. Mr. J. H. Good appeared as counsel for Hooper.

ASSASSINATION DAY.—To-morrow being Assassination Day the services in St. Dunstan's Cathedral will be as follows: First Mass at 5.30, second Mass at 7.30, and third Mass at 8.30; and the May devotions at 9 p. m.

St. Peter's Cathedral: Holy Eucharist at 7.45 and (choral) at 10 a. m. Matins at 9. Choral Evensong at 7.30.

St. Paul's Church: The usual morning service will be held at 11 o'clock.

POLICE COURT.—The two Waughn brothers, Benjamin and William, appeared before His Honor at the Police Court this morning. The brothers are charged with several larcenies from different houses in the city. Several witnesses were examined, including S. B. Enman, from whose residence the razor and ladies' sash were taken; Israel Thorpe, who purchased the stolen razor from the boys; Jane Thorpe, who purchased the razor from one of the brothers; the boy McLeod, who identified the razor stolen from his house on King Street East; Marshal Cameron, who swore out the search warrant; Sergeant Bralley and Officer Campbell, who searched the home of the Waughn brothers and found a lot of stolen articles; William Bastian, who identified the accordion as his stolen from the residence of Mr. Miller, Prince Street; and found by the officers in the home of the brothers; and the father, brother and sister of the two prisoners. After hearing the evidence of the witnesses the case was adjourned until Monday next.

MR. JAMES McISAAC'S LECTURE.—The lecture on "The Life and Times of Frederic Ozeman," by Mr. James McIsaac, in St. Patrick's Hall on Monday evening, was well attended. Among those present were His Lordship Bishop McDonald, Lieutenant Governor Howland, United States Consul Kaue, the Judge of Probate, the clergy of the Cathedral and St. Dunstan's College. The chair was occupied by Professor Caven, the President of the Charlottetown Conference of St. Vincent de Paul Society, under the patronage of which the lecture was delivered. The subject was dealt with in a masterly manner, and during the time of its delivery—one hour and a quarter—the attention of the audience was invariably fixed, and the feelings of the listeners carried with those of the speaker. An attempt to give a summary of his discourse would be decidedly unjust to the lecturer, and would only mar the beauty and harmony that characterized his theme from beginning to end. The first part of the lecture was devoted to a description of the reign of scepticism that grew out of the revolutionary period in France. The second part of the discourse was mainly devoted to the life and labors of Ozeman, with occasional references to the illustrious savants who seconded him in his noble work and who by their labors, have exalted to their undying glory the monumental *acte perennans*. The lecturer, on resuming his seat, was earnestly applauded. Rev. Dr. Morrison, of St. Dunstan's College, in a few well chosen remarks, seconded the vote of thanks. The motion being put was unanimously carried. Professor Caven presented the thanks of the audience to the lecturer, to which he suitably replied.

SUPREME COURT—EASTER TERM.

TUESDAY, May 1.

MORSON vs. McLEOD.—This was action of replevin for the recovery of land in King's County, tried before the Chief Justice at Georgetown in February last, and judgment was now delivered. The whole question was one of fact, and the Judge, after a long examination, held that the plaintiff was entitled to the whole of the land claimed.

ROBERTSON vs. KENNEDY.—Action for trespass to land at Lot 48. This case had been tried before Mr. Justice Hodgson last Trinity Term, and he now delivered judgment, the effect of which was that the plaintiff was entitled to recover, but not in the present form of action. He, therefore, ordered judgment to be entered for the defendant.

In the matter of the application of Alexander Horse for a writ of certiorari. In this case Alexander Horse sued Daniel McDonald in the County Court for \$100 damages for breach of contract. The trial occupied three days, and Judge Alley, having taken time to consider his decision, prepared a written judgment. The case had been adjourned, and while the Judge was in the act of delivering his decision, Mr. Horse's attorney, Mr. W. S. Stewart, applied for a nonsuit. This Judge Alley refused, as being too late, and proceeded to deliver judgment for the defendant. Mr. Horse then applied for an appeal, which the Clerk of the County Court refused. Mr. Justice Hodgson, on the application of the County Court Judge in Meacham vs. Robertson, where it was held, interpreting a proviso of the County Court Act, that no appeal lies from a decision of a Judge of the County Court, held that the decision of the County Court Judge was final, and that the plaintiff was not entitled to a writ of certiorari.

MR. JUSTICE HODGSON.—The Chief Justice held that the right of the plaintiff to elect to be assessed ceased the moment the County Court Judge commenced to deliver his decision, and that the delivering by the judge of his decision and the reasons therefor are one and the same act. Both Judges anticipated their opinion that the decision of the Supreme Court in this Province in Meacham vs. Robertson cannot be upheld; and that in all cases an appeal lies from a judgment in the County Court for the defendant.

A REMARKABLE CAREER.

Our Old Friend in Court.

(Special to the Montreal Star.)

TORONTO, April 28.—In a suit being tried here, brought by Rebecca Marion against Agnes C. Youmans for \$10,000 "slander, in which Margaret Shepherd, the convert," is a witness, the lawyer for the defendants succeeded in drawing from Mrs. Shepherd a history of her life, which created a great sensation in court. The witness in giving her evidence frequently appealed to the jury. The main points brought out in her examination were as follows: She was born in India, her mother's name being Regan. She had lived in England, and was there imprisoned for taking some money. The name by which she when she was convicted was Louise Egerton. She subsequently spent some time at St. James' House in London. She did not go there under the name of Louise Westland. She admitted being detained in prison in Bodman, Cornwall, awaiting trial on another charge of Georgia Parkyn. She had lived in Ireland. She had gone from Bristol to London in July, 1885, where she entered the service of Mr. Stead, Editor of the Pall Mall Gazette. She was employed by him to interview the mother of Eliza Armstrong and also to interview women of evil life to obtain proof that young children were being sold for immoral purposes. While in Mr. Stead's employment she lived with Mrs. Booth, of the Salvation Army, under the name of Margaret Herbert. In 1886, she came to America, under the auspices of the Salvation Army. She married Mr. Shepard in Charlottetown, P. E. I., on April 4, 1886, her first husband being then living, though without her knowledge. Both of her husbands are at present living. She parted from Shepard when she learned that Parkyn was alive. She had subsequently been engaged in work in connection with churches in Boston and Chicago. During Mrs. Shepard's examination the court room was densely crowded and her replies were followed with close attention by all present. The suit against Mrs. Youmans is not yet finished.
