Strange But True

Wasp's knew how to manufacture long before it was invented by man. The wasp reduced wood fibre to pulp, and then weaver proofed the nest with a protective varnish to keep out the rain.

The skin of an adult hippo exudes a pink sweat which covers parts of the animal's face and body like soap suds. When this dries it forms a fine powder.

Edward Easton of Georgetown, P. E. I., has a chain that was cut from a solid piece of wood that came from a tree which grew where the old market building used to stand in Charlottetown.

Scientists are considering seriously a man-made earth satellite, mounting a huge "sun gun" to concentrate the sun's rays on the earth.

Albert Sternfeld, a Russian scientist reports that soviet multi-rockets have zoomed some 300 miles into space. The significance of the report, if true, is this: The development of a multi-stage rocket capable of taking a one-ton load up nearly 300 miles above our earth would be the first step in creating an artificial earth satellite.

The "sun gun" theory is expounded by Professor Hermann Oberth, who invented the V-2 rocket which the Germans used with considerable success towards the end of World War II.

The professor believes it is impossible to construct giant space mirrors that could be fastened to an artificial satellite to focus the sun's rays on the earth.

American scientists also have been studying the possibilities of an earth satellite. One of them, Dr. La Paz of the University of New Mexico, said that the nation first establishing a space station will win control of the world.

Austin, Texas, will be the world's first completely air-conditioned town. 22 families will move into brand-new homes. Then for a year scientists will study the effects of

manufactured weather on their health and home life. One important question that will be answered is whether filtered air at controlled temperature reduces the frequency of colds and relieves hay fever sufferers and allergy victims.

Each research home will have some 1,000 square feet of living space, all on one floor. A wide range of construction materials and housing styles will be employed in the homes. Each family moving into the unit must put up \$12,000.

During the next year the homes will be the subject of elaborate research.

From the industrial standpoint, the key question is whether complete air-conditioning is possible and practical in a home of modest cost.

Scientists also will measure the heat gain and loss factors of different colored plants used on the outside of such homes. What colors and textures provide the best roofing materials, and the effect of shading devices, such as awnings and curtains, on room temperature.

A number of the homes have built in electronic instruments to keep a record of temperature changes inside the houses and to chart the effect of air-conditioning on materials and fabrics. Special mobile labs, mounted on trucks will make periodic tours of the village to test homes that are not so equipped.

The experiment in ultra-modern living is sponsored by the National Association of Home Builders, the air-conditioned industry, and the University of Texas. What next?
