In Memoriam

MRS. THOMAS GILLESPIE

After several months illness, which was borne with Christian patience and full resignation to the will of God, there passed to her rest, one of Carleton's most highly respected residents, Mrs. Thomas B. Gillespie, the former Thonie B. Gillespie, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Fenurck Lefurgey of Bedeque, P. E. I.

Before her marriage, Mrs. Gillespie taught school in several districts of the Island; and after the death of her husband, two years ago, deciding on resuming her former profession, Mrs. Gillespie took a refresher course at P. W. C., and last autumn, began teaching school in Carleton, her home district, where in the primary department, for the short time health allowed her to continue in her much loved work, she endeared herself to the pupils.

Her removal from her work by sickness, and then by death, is felt as a great loss to the school and district. Mrs. Gillespie passed to her rest at the Prince County Hospital, Summerside, on April 12th, 1955, in her sixty-fifth year. Mrs. Gillespie leaves to mourn, one daughter, Doris, (Mrs. Hazen MacWilliams) of Cape Traverse, who was devoted to her mother, giving up her school work in Cape Traverse, to be with her mother during her illness; two sons, Hazen, on the homestead in Carleton, and Gordon, Canada Ltd., Montreal, Que.; two sisters, Alma (Mrs. Elmer Cotton) of Clinton, and Jennie (Mrs. Reginald Barwise) of Charlottetown, and one brother, Harold of North Bedeque. One brother, Dr. Alexander Lefurgey passed away several years ago in Alberton, P. E. I.

The funeral, which was largely attended, was held from her late home on Thursday, April 14th, 1955, the service being conducted by her pastor, Rev. J. H. Bishop, assisted by Rev. W. R. MacKay. The interment was in the family plot in the Cape Traverse Free Church of Scotland Cemetery, beside her husband, whom she loved so well, and had so tenderly nursed in his last illness only two years before.

VIENNA (AP) — The Austrian parliament unanimously ratified Tuesday the treaty of independence granted this Alpine country by the Big Four recently.

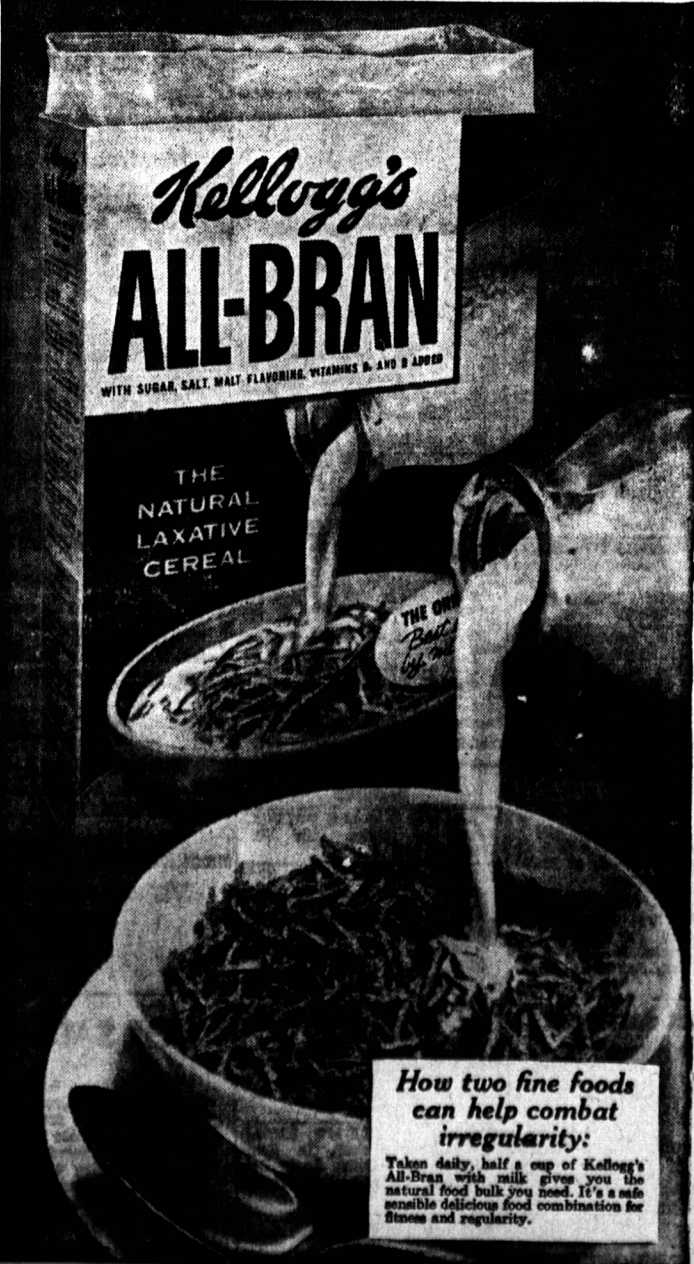
