We have not space to particularise the numerous articles which the three Magazines contain, but we must say that we have read several of them with considerable interest.

THE AMERICAN PROPOSAL FOR FREE TRADE.

To admit a long list of American manufactures free, while similar articles, the product of our mechanics, are to be heavily taxed, would seem to be a novel kind of Reciprocity, and a curious mode of inaugurating free trade! To discriminate against British imports, and admit American goods free, to leave our shoes, fabrics, carriages, locomotives, &c., heavily taxed is the notable特色 of which the Globe thinks so highly! We are warned against confederation with Canada, because this involves free trade, and urged to grant something very near to free trade to the United States, while we refuse to do so, only agreeing to a Treaty which many of our ablest writers declare pretty fair to both parties, while many regard the United States as having the best of the bargain. Unless we quite misapprehend the nature of the telegram, we fancy that such a proposition for Reciprocity "over the left" will find favour here. We believe that we might safely agree to a Treaty of Trade with the States, and then they must grant free trade to us, in the same articles. Apart from entire free trade, it may be politic to keep our tariffs as low as possible, but we must not have a high tariff for Lancashire and Birmingham, and a low one for Lowell, Boston and New York.—St. John's Presbyterian.

CANADA.

An Ottawa correspondent writes:—The opinion is gaining ground here, and elsewhere, that instead of Mr. Brown having objected to his high-handed course, he is a man who is strongly advocated such a course, and that it was because his colleagues declined to inaugurate it before exhausting every effort to conciliate the Americans, and prevent the renewal of Reciprocity, that he resigned. It is told here as a great deal of snuffing by Americans against our frontier towns, such as Brookville, Prescott, Cornwall, &c., and that the Government at Washington, for the purpose of stopping it, are taking energetic measures, and subjecting all persons crossing the river to a most rigorous examination. Nearly all the shops have been cleared of their stocks, and old-fashioned ribbons and silks, lying by for years, have come to a capital market.

The Hon. Ferguson Blair, the newly appointed member of the Canadian Government, has been retained without opposition. In his speech he said his constituents had intelligence has been received from Washington that the prohibition of the cattle trade is to be resumed immediately.

A man named Sloan has been arrested at Quebec on a charge of murdering his wife. On Sunday night he asked her for some money which she refused, when he gave her such a beating that she died shortly after from the effects of it, in the Marine Hospital.

The buildings recently burned in Quebec belonging to the nuns of Montreuil, cost \$200,000, and were insured for \$5,000.

"Petitions to the Home Government, looking to a peaceful secession from England and annexation to the United States, or the formation of a separate Government, are said to be in circulation among annexationists in the rural districts."

And the annexed refutation of the slander is from the Toronto Globe:—

"The inhabitants of our rural districts will feel very far from flattered by this latest invention of the genius who supplies the readers of the Herald with such a plentiful and never weary period when the whole body of Canadians were so entirely hostile to 'annexation' as at the present day. That any such 'petition' has been circulated and received signatures, we are satisfied is an unmitigated falsehood. As all countries have some persons anxious for change, so we in Canada have had in the past some few dissatisfied spirits in favor of annexation; but their number has been so contemptibly small that they are hardly worthy of consideration, and even those few grumblers have of late become entirely silent."
