OCTOBER CHEESE.

Cheese can be made as firm and as fine during October as at any other time of the year if suitable conveniences for controlling the temperature of the curd from the milk vat until the cheese is ripe are provided.

The milk delivered at factories during October has a higher per cent of fat and other solids than during the summer months. Its flavor will be equally rich and nice when the cows are stabled during the cool nights and fed liberally on fodder corn or any other suitable succulent, nutritious feed. Turnip tops and rape should not be fed to cows whose milk is furnished to a cheese factory. After the milk is drawn it should be strained immediately and forthwith stirred as thoroughly as during the hot weather in July. The aeration will improve its flavor and prepare it for the manufacture of a finer quality of cheese than will be possible to obtain if this treatment is neglected. The milk should not be cooled below 60 degrees Fahr. A milk house or the farm kitchen will be a more suitable place for keeping it over night than the open milk stands when the thermometer stands below 50 degrees.

METHODIC WOMEN IN COUNCIL.

The fifteenth annual meeting of the board of managers of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church of Canada opened in Grace church, Brantford, Ont., on Tuesday and continued until Thursday. The meeting was attended by delegates from all parts of the Dominion.

The following is a list of the officers of the society: President, Mrs. James Gooderham; vice-president, Mrs. (Dr.) Carman, Toronto; recording secretary, Mrs. George Kerr, Toronto; corresponding secretary, Mrs. E. S. Strachan, Hamilton; treasurer, Mrs. T. Thompson, Toronto; editor of publication, Ontario, Mrs. Gordon Wright, London; secretary treasurer of literary and publishing committee, Miss Ogden, Toronto.

The maritime province representatives include the following from the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Islands: Brantford, Miss Palmer, St. John; corresponding secretary, Miss H. S. Stewart, Sackville, N. B.; delegates, Mrs. E. C. Turner, Pownal, P. E. I.; Mrs. H. Sprague, St. Stephen, N. B.; Mrs. Thos. Hart, Sackville, N. B.; P. E. I. Mrs. C. B. Stephen, N. B.; alternate, Mrs. R. Johnson, Charlottetown, P. E. I.; Mrs. C. Strong, Summerside, P. E. I.

The report of the treasurer showed the amounts contributed by the different branches to be as follows: \$5,572 London; 5,105 Hamilton; 5,100 Toronto; 5,125 Bay of Quinte; 4,025 Montreal; 4,000 Nova Scotia; 4,992 British Columbia; 213 Manitoba and N. W. T.; 647

Auxiliaries outside of branches: St. John's, Nfld., Gower street ..... 87 St. John's, West Newfoundland ..... 142 Bonavista ..... 27 Total raised by auxiliaries was \$35,714. This is \$400 more than the auxiliaries raised last year. The total amount raised from all sources was \$38,747.

According to the report of the corresponding secretary, there are now nine branches in the Dominion and three auxiliaries in Newfoundland. In the 661 auxiliaries there are 13,863 members, which, with 785 life members, brings the total membership up to 14,649, an increase of 724. The mission circles and bands in general have continued most zealous and active, now numbering 286, with 6,759 members, but in some cases they have allowed themselves to be absorbed by a larger organization without a corresponding recognition of the claims in some of the returns from the younger branches. The income for the past year, \$38,747, appears to be a decrease, but the difference is largely due to the receipts from the conference account being \$1,295 less than that of last year, and the fact that the B. C. conference branch in changing the close of its year from September to May, has sent the receipts of only six months, so that in reality the decrease is rather apparent than real. The amount raised by the auxiliaries is actually more than in any previous year.
