The Seal Question Again

Arbitration Doesn't Always Settle.

LONDON, July 16.—The newspapers hear gnash their teeth over the sharp reply of Mr. Secretary Sherman to Lord Salisbury in the Seal controversy. The Half penny journal's issued sensational at placards bearing such lines as "Twisting the Lion's Tail again" and "America Shrieks at England."

The more serious papers deal with the situation editorially. The Globe in the in a slashing article, headed "Yankee Insolence" says that the memories of Cleveland's impertinent message are all revived by the extraordinary and insulting despatch which Mr. Sherman had permitted to find its way into the papers.

The St. James Gazette says that the publication is a further demonstration of certain trans-atlantic methods of diplomacy which may one day involve consequences much more serious.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

OTTAWA, July 13.—Workmen are busy putting Sir Wilfred Laurier's new residence, on Theodore street, formerly owned and inhabited by the late Mr. Leslie, into shape against his return. The house which is now owned by Mr. Bate, father of Capt. H. C. Bate, who accompanied Sir Wilfred, is not far from Stalacour Hall, at the time the residence of Sir John A. Macdonald.

OTTAWA, July 14.—The government is being strongly urged to impose a duty on fresh fish warehoused in Canada for export equal to the amount of bounty allowed by the French government. This bounty covers the outfit of vessels amounting on an average to \$200; \$2 per quintal on dry fish exported to America, the West Indies and West Coast of Africa, and \$1.60 per quintal to European countries or foreign states on the shores of the Mediterranean, and \$2 per quintal on all cod roes exported to France to be used as bait in sardine fishing. These bounties operate most injuriously against Canadian and Newfoundland fishermen and a touch of retaliation or protection would be beneficial.

LONDON, July 14.—Sir L. H. Davies, the Canadian minister of marine, who was summoned to London in connection with the Behring Sea seal controversy and the Belgian and German trade treaties, said to the correspondent of the Associated Press today: "Since my arrival I have conferred with John W. Foster, the United States special commissioner, on the sealing question, and with the British Colonial Office. The latest phase of the matter is a proposal emanating from the United States Government that the American, Canadian and British seal commissioners should meet this autumn, return to the sealing grounds, and in conjunction with officials specially representing the Governments concerned, consider the situation in the light of the latest facts collected by specialists. This plan was submitted by Mr. Foster only a few days ago. Nothing can be done this season, and Great Britain has decided that there is insufficient data to justify any change. The fact is that the Americans have never loyally accepted the Paris award, and have never accepted the fact that the sealing herd, as a herd, is not more theirs than ours. It seems that their movement now is more or less controlled by the idea of getting the Paris award altered. From the evidence which I have examined, I am strongly of the opinion that, if the interests of the sealers themselves are to be regarded, they cannot stand a further loss of right."

The Dominion government has decided to put the alien labor law in force in Manitoba, the North-West and British Columbia, so as to protect the Canadian workmen on the Crow's Nest Pass Railway from imported labor from the United States. The act can be put in operation by the minister of justice, Sir Oliver Mowat, appointing an agent to administer the act. It is therefore likely that agents will be appointed at Winnipeg, Manitoba; Lethbridge, N. W. T., and Rossland, B. C., and probably other points in the west, without delay, so as to set the machinery of the alien labor law in operation.
