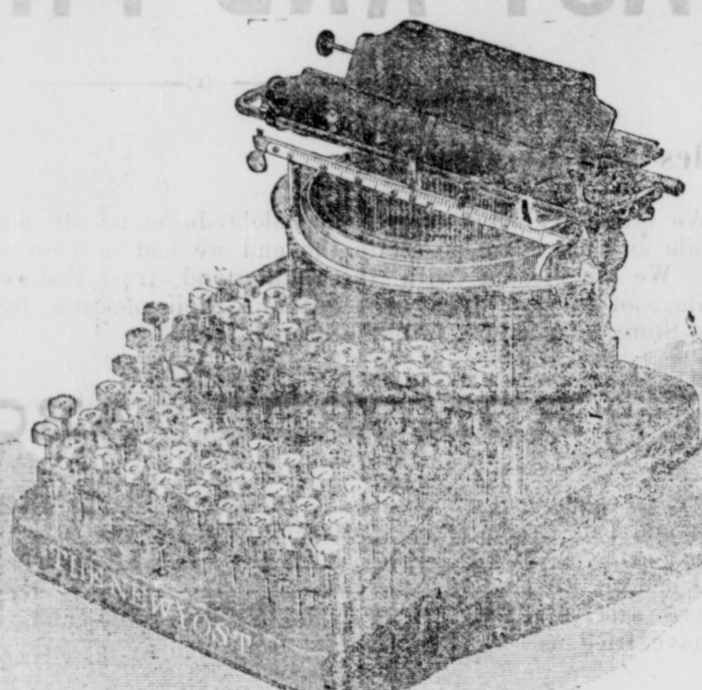

## A DISEASE OF THE NERVES.

Intemperance More Frequent Among Women Than It Ever Has Been Before.

It is said by those in a position to know that it is of no use to disguise the terrible fact that intemperance is more frequent among women than it has ever been before, more general, and more ruinous, to the point of physical and mental mortality.

It makes us shudder to hear the facts in the cases, to listen even to the suppositions concerning its causes, one supposition being that the intemperate woman, by the intemperate use of wine and spirits to maintain the gait—that is, the having more wine in her system and spending it fast, and in doing it fast engenders pleasures to whose enjoyment the strength is not equal without the help of the exciting and stimulating element.

Another cause is said to be the prevalent absence of both religious and moral sentiment, the abolition of every thing that cannot be seen or felt, the reign of pure reason and realism, the custom of considering that if one wants a thing simply to have it, and that there should be no restraint upon one's desires further than the inability to gratify them.

A third cause is given as the custom of the intemperate woman to be more young and middle-aged women than we have dreamed of having acquired a fancy or a fashion for the use of this little article of diet, to create a thirst, and the thirst which only strong drink satisfies. There are instances, too, where the dreadful evil has been brought about by the prescription of physicians the invalid thus having the habit established before being aware of what it is.

But these instances are few in comparison to the number of those which result from the apparent innocent glass taken at table or elsewhere. The usual excuse is that it may be indulged with all the other tastes, at table or on the sleeping porch, or in the privacy of the restaurant or the delectable country of any sort causes the stimulant to be resorted to with a hope that its temporary exhilaration will tide over the temporary depression.

These pernicious habits, all circumstances of life are rapid, exhausting, nerve-draining. The great stress under which we live occasions a degeneration of the nerves, and the swiftest and easiest resources then is the stimulant.

Knowing this, knowing that young girls are liable to this degeneration, it becomes doubly important that they should be sheltered by the force of a public opinion, which may make it, at any rate, difficult for them to start.

But it is hardly possible to start them on the way if they refuse to take the first step, and this is impossible to acquire the habit of intemperance.

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## PROPOSED ROUTE NEW.

From London to Sydney by Way of Canada.

The prospects of the new route from London to Sydney by way of Canada seem to be unencumbered bright. It appears that since the first boat started last May there has been a steady increase both in the number of passengers and in the amount of merchandise carried.

Previously to May last the trade between the Sandwich Islands and the American continent was a monopoly for an American firm, and, inasmuch as the islands in tropical fruits sent from seven to eight million dollars a year, the trade was not insignificant.

Then San Francisco received the bananas and the tropical fruits sent from the islands, and forwarded to Canada and to Washington Territory in the "Culls," or the inferior parts of the consignments; while the United States despatched manufactured goods to Honolulu in exchange.

But by the first vessel that left Vancouver for Sydney, the great demand in Canada for fruits of all kinds, and the trade has already assumed considerable dimensions. Canada now gets her fruit direct, eats a good deal more of it than she did before, and pays for it with her salmon or her manufactured goods, thus gaining a double advantage.

In the near future a third steamship, specially designed for carrying frozen meat, will be put on the line, in order that Canada may get mutton or beef from Australia and send back frozen salmon, halibut or other fish from British Columbia. As regards the inter-island trade generally, the great factor in the situation is that a steamer leaves Sydney in the middle of the Australian winter and arrives at Canada in the height of summer, and vice versa.

With a view of encouraging the new trade, the Canadian Pacific Railway is, for the first year or two, charging only cost price for the freight of its goods to British Columbia or to Australia or Honolulu. The establishment of a line of swift steamers between Canada and Great Britain will now, it is thought, soon be established.
