MR. Yesterday's issue of that paper contains two columns and a half of a report of a meeting alleged to be held at Murray Harbor South "on the 13th instant," but which is dated "Murray Harbor, Nov. 2." There is evidently something wrong in these dates. But there is something else which is not wrong in this report, and that is a new thing in Patriot reporting. Here is what Sir Louis Davies is reported as saying at the meeting in question:

"In his travels over the constituency he saw remarkable changes in the political opinions of electors. Mr. Martin has been a persistent applicant for the justice in the Murray Harbor and Belfast Railway, and to no other man are we more indebted for the railway and bridge than the same young candidate who now stood before us. Last year's grant of three-quarters of a million for this work were largely due to the assistance we had received from Mr. Martin, in the able way which he had stated the case before the Government."
