Summary of Proceedings

ANOTHER OBSTRUCTION MOTION.

The Cochran Charges

OTTAWA, Sept. 3. In the House of Commons yesterday Sir Richard Cartwright moved a motion of want of confidence, based on the census returns. He made an enthusiastic blue-ruin speech. Hon. Mr. Foster replied ably. The debate was adjourned at an early hour. It was very flat. Charlton and Ananias Cameron succeeded in emptying the House at an early stage of the discussion. The charges against Mr. Cochran, M. P., were heard before the Committee yesterday. They will probably collapse. The chief witness for the prosecution contradicted himself so terribly under cross-examination that his evidence is totally discredited.

COLLISION AT SEA.

Two Barques Disabled.

GEORGETOWN, Sept. 3. Capt. Leslie, of the schr. Azelia, which arrived here this morning from St. Pierre, reports sighting on Tuesday morning the barque Rock City, in ballast, and another barque, lumber laden, whose name he did not ascertain, 120 miles west half north from Langly. The Rock City had her bulwarks on the starboard side carried away; also her bowsprit, headgear and foremast gone. Spoke her but did not get an answer. Her crew, he supposed, did not understand English. Spoke also a boat, evidently going to her assistance from the other barque, whose jibboom and headgear was carried away and bow stove in, and was told it was a collision. Both vessels, when last seen, were standing towards Sydney.

OTTAWA, Sept. 3. Before the Senate Railway Committee, yesterday, Robert McGreevy, who was summoned as a witness, failed to appear. Armstrong produced statements showing the disposal of every dollar of subsidies which Lungellier alleged had been embezzled. Loneragan, president of the new company, testified. When asked if any bill, he emphatically replied "No." The girls were trying to work a little scandal about some member of the Commons, but the answer promptly silenced them.

LONDON, Sept. 3. Spurgeon is gradually sinking. He was too weak yesterday to take nourishment.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, Sept. 2.—Quebec—Codfishing good at St. John River and Sheldrake; fair at Long Point, Magpie, Newport Point; but poor at all other points. Luncheon taken in large quantities at Long Point and Sheldrake. P. E. I.—Mackerel fisheries fair at Miminogash, good at Malpeque; cod and hake fair at the latter and hake still plentiful at Souris. Cape Breton—Fishing of all kinds very dull all over the coast; Mackerel reported schooling outside Meat Cove, and a few taking hooks; also, about a half quintal of cod per boat. No fishing reported on the shores of Nova Scotia.
