

# Saints-P.W.C. Rugby Series Ends In Draw

## Play To Scoreless Tie In Sixth Series Game

The long, brilliantly played, keenly fought football series between the Second Saints and Prince of Wales College is over, coming to an end on moonlight Memorial Field yesterday evening following seventy minutes of scoreless play in the sixth and final game.

As a result there are no winners of the Prince Edward Island Intermediate football championship for the first time in history. Never before were the colleges unable to decide a winner in their annual series.

The teams yesterday, after playing through regular time without scoring a point, decided to play an over-time session to see if the deadlock could be broken. After ten minutes of play referee Earl Nicholson blew the game-ending whistle appropriately enough ending play in neutral territory.

This was the series of all football series between the two colleges. Beginning as a best of three affair it was extended to six games. Four of the games ended in a draw while each team chalked up one victory. On top of that each squad scored an identical 28 points.

Gordon Bennett's Welshmen were the better offensive team of the field yesterday in that they had an edge on play but a determined Saint Dunstan's defense, mindful of Custer's Last Stand, held the line. The Saints were coached by John Eldon Green.

For fifteen minutes in the early part of the second half the Welshmen hammered at the S.D.U. line but could not find an opening. Once they crossed the line but the play was off-side. Again Rolfe Lee was only inches away when he was halted.

Lee, on the receiving end of a half-line run, seemingly was in the clear for a try when he was dragged down on the one yard line by Len Shea. Lee was partially blocked and went to touch the ball over for the try when Kenny Macdonald came swooping down to block his effort and prevent a score.

Tweedy led assault after assault on the Saints line but the red and white defenses held. Once Jack Clarkin winded Tweedy with a crunching shoulder tackle. On another occasion Brewer Auld was injured when hit by two tacklers. Jack Macdonald finally relieved the pressure with a beautiful kick down the sidelines. The Saints rushed down on the receiver to block a return kick and carried play to centre field. For the re-

mainder of the game play was on even terms.

Prince of Wales forced from the opening whistle and following a smart half-line passing play Mark Ladner ran deep into S.D.U. territory. The Saints carried the play back to centre field and a 30 yard run by Shea brought the ball down to the Welshmen's 15 yard line.

Shea was brought down by Ladner's tackle and Ladner was injured on the play. The fast moving three-quarter man was forced to leave the game a few minutes later.

The Welshmen forced the play back into Saints territory again and plays ranged between centre field and the S.D.U. 25 yard line. Before the half ended the Saints led by Shea forged back on the attack once more.

The City Collegians marched to the Saints line shortly after the second half opening and stayed there for 15 minutes. Tweedy fell over the line on the ball but was offside and the try didn't count.

After the Saints relieved the pressure Billy MacIsaac carried the ball to centre field on a nice run and Shea brought the ball down to the Welshmen's 25 before being stopped by Norris Mizuno.

Dave MacLeod of Prince of Wales College brought the play back to Saint Dunstan's territory with a nice run and following an exchange of kicks Lewis Macdonald of St. Dunstan's made a smart 25 yard run down the sidelines to centre field.

In the over-time period the Welshmen again had an edge but could not get past the Saints ten yard line. Kimbal Jay relieved the pressure by running the ball back to his own thirty-five yard line. The game ended with play in centre field.

Late in the second half picking quarter Doug Cudmore was forced to leave the game suffering from a nose bleed.

The game was again handled by Earl Nicholson and Nick made a good job of a difficult task.

A crowd of about 15,000 saw the fiercely-fought struggle in Civic Stadium in perfect, sunny weather. The second game will be a complete reversal of form with the Alouettes will send the series into a third game scheduled for next Wednesday in Montreal.
