THE GASPEZIA IN PORT.

**She Arrived Yesterday Afternoon
and Expects to Leave To-morrow.**

The steamer Gaspesia, the pioneer
boat of the Canadian Steamship Company
arrived yesterday afternoon about four
o'clock, and moored at Poole's and
Navigation Company's wharves. Great
crowds of people were on the wharves to
see her come in, and many of them went
on board after she was docked.

About eight o'clock in the morning,
the Gaspesia grounded off Rice Point, but
got off again at high tide before the Prin-
cess, which had been despatched to her
assistance, got outside the harbor. Thick
weather and floating ice are responsible
for the accident.

The Gaspesia's tonnage, freight capacity
and other information of a similar charac-
ter, has already been given by THE EXAM-
INER, and need not be gone over again. Her
passenger and freight accommodation is
good. She discharged a fair freight and
110 passengers at New Carlisle, and has
about 500 tons for this port. She will have
a large outward cargo, and it is expected
that she will be ready to sail on Friday
evening.

Captain Thomas McKinnon, an ex-
perienced navigator, is in command of
the Gaspesia, and he is assisted by other
officers of experience and ability.

There was an enjoyable luncheon on
board the steamer this afternoon at one
o'clock.
