Members held a one-minute silence in memory of the late patron of the society, Thomas Flynn.

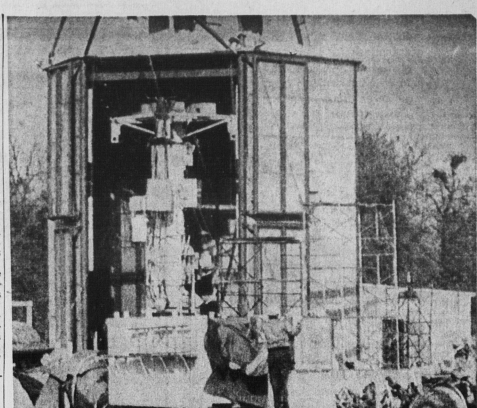
Box wishes for a speedy recovery were voiced for the president, Brady Smith, who is in the hospital. In his absence, the meeting was presided over by John Walsh.

LARGEST BUILDING PERMIT ISSUED HERE - \$5,099,994

The largest single building permit ever issued by civic authorities here was handed to Puggott Construction Company yesterday, for erection of the new Fabrics of Confidence Memorial Building, in the amount of \$5,099,994.

It is believed the biggest individual building job ever undertaken here.

Site of the contract was made illustrated City Engineer Norman Stewart said, by comparison with the total value of permits issued in 1961, which set a record for construction permits valued at \$5,133,000. Last year Mr. Stewart stated the value of building permits issued by his office was \$2,718,000.

Work on the big job will start Monday morning, and the first task of construction workers will be erection of a plywood fence around the project to prevent anyone falling into excavations.

Work will mean the end of parking in the area, especially near the Market Square, as motorists will have to look for their cars elsewhere.

The first phase of the building is scheduled for completion by May 1 next, which was previously announced.

Election Enumerators Start Work Monday

Enumerators for the April 8 Monday election will start their work Monday morning on the big task of listing all voters across the province.

According to the preliminary list for last year's election in Queens County, there were 25,662 eligible voters in Queens County.

There are only two changes noticeable this year, and with these exceptions the boundaries of all polls remain as before. The changes are in Poll 1, along the Charlottemore waterfront, which has been amended to include all federal vessels attached to this port, and the poll bordering the northern city limits, which are automatically changed since the former "Man's Land" is now part of the city.

While the enumerators are busy at their work next week, Mr. Gaudet said, the next task of the returning officer is the selection of the various polling stations and the naming of deputy returning officers and clerks to man them.

As late as yesterday, there still several enumerators who had not yet appeared to pick up their kits for the job, which they must start on Monday.

BALLOON ON WAY TO LAUNCH PAD

A balloon train containing the giant tandem balloon that will lift a 36-inch reflector telescope some 20,000 feet to study the planet Mars moves past the telescope in its housing at the launch site in Palafra, Texas. Shortly after the balloon was hoisted to the launching pad, rising winds forced another postponement. The project, being conducted by Princeton and Univ. of California scientists, seeks to determine if organic life exists on Mars. (AP Wirephoto)

The case of Ronald R. MacDonald, Amundeville, charged with false pretenses, was withdrawn on request by the complainant, Horace B. W. 11111, Charlottemore.

The charge against Frederick McGaughan, Charlottemore, of being drunk and disorderly was withdrawn by the complainant. Four charges of going through shooting.

MIRAGE CRASHES

PARIS (Reuters) — France's prototype A-bomber, the Mirage-IV, crashed near Orleans Wednesday. Official sources said Thursday the crew of two escaped by ejector seat but the pilot, a captain, broke both legs on landing by parachute. The supersonic aircraft was the first prototype. It had been flying for three years and had logged 400 flying hours.

Property Damage Results In Fine To Lady Fane Man

In Queens County magistrate's court yesterday afternoon a case of Raymond Francis Griffin, Tracville, was adjourned until Feb. 19 by Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C.

Griffin is charged with uttering defamatory words in the amount of \$8, payable to "Rugby Club."

Pleading guilty to damaging the property of Stanley Mayhew, to a value of less than \$50, Hebburn Harry Fall, Lady Fane, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days in jail, who he was ordered to pay \$25 in damages to Mr. Mayhew.

Charles R. McQuaid appeared for Kenneth Eldon Elms, Monastery, N. S., entered a plea of guilty to the charge of failing to stop at the scene of an accident, and a fine of \$25 and costs or 10 days was imposed.

Convicted on the charge of oversteering and passing another vehicle on the highway where there was a solid white line, Charles Maxwell Stewart, Burnside, was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

CASE SET OVER

The case of John Wallace Dalton, Fort Augustus, charged with driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, was remanded until Feb. 22, to fix a date for hearing.

The case of John Wallace MacNeill, Milton, charged with driving without due care and attention, was adjourned by consent until March 1. In these three cases, counsel for the defence is John F. Nicholson.

Due to defence counsel, Allison M. Gillis, being out of the province, the cases of two accused, one charged with parking in a "no parking" area and the other for failing to stop at a "stop" sign were both adjourned.

OTTAWA (CP)—Immigration Minister Bell announced Wednesday that visas will no longer be necessary for citizens of Denmark, Finland, Norway and Sweden who visit Canada for three months or less. The move was described as part of a long-range program to stimulate travel formalities. Already exempt from obtaining such visas are citizens of Commonwealth countries, Ireland, France, Iceland and countries of North, Central and South America.

Housing Comm. To Present Brief To City On Taxation

The Provincial Housing Commission expects to have its brief, relative to city taxes on homes in the North River area co-operative housing area, ready for presentation to City Commission Chairman Reid Sangster, said there has been some dissatisfaction by members of the co-operative group over the tax rate on their properties. "Some home owners, perhaps a dozen," he said, "may be forced to move because of what are to them, too high taxes."

He said the whole situation will be discussed with City Council, "and I am sure the satisfaction of all."

It is expected that the brief will outline the assistance the co-operative movement has received from the provincial government and Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, and that a request will be made to the city that some leniency be given on taxes.
