ALLEY vs. DUCHEMIN.—This morning Messrs. Duchemin Bros. started the machinery of their factory on Prince Street. Our readers will remember that about eighteen months ago the plaintiff, Alley, obtained an injunction out of the Court of Chancery, restraining the Messrs. Duchemin from working their steam engine in their present factory. After long and tedious trials and arguments before the Master of the Rolls, and a special jury, the case was finally decided in favor of Alley, to the extent that the defendants were not to run their engine to his annoyance or discomfort. From this judgment, which we published in full, the Duchemins intend appealing, and in the meantime, we learn they are going on with their work. The case is evidently only in its infancy.

MR. WM. MURRAY, baker, has a parrot which spends a good portion of its time in fine weather flying round the neighborhood. A favorite resort with Polly is a large tree behind the house occupied by Miss Saint Clair opposite the jail. Here one day lately Polly in her researches came upon a Robin's nest and straightway proceeded to destroy it. The owners vainly interposed to save their property and drive away their assailant. Polly was more than a match for the enraged proprietors, who flew away discomfited after witnessing the total destruction of their home. It was a heartless case of ejectment, not however, meant to let pass without a terrible revenge. In a short time the ejected Robins returned accompanied by other two, to whom, no doubt, they had communicated the tale of their hardships. The four at once made a combined attack on Polly, who, however competent to fight against two, was forced to succumb to four, and after a severe loss of plumage retreated. The contest must have been a protracted one, for it was long after the usual hour when Polly returned to her perch at Mr. Murray's. The robins have commenced the work of reconstructing, and Polly, though still a visitor to the tree, is content to watch with sundry ejaculations, the operations from a distance, deeming no doubt, discretion the better part of valor.

The above, from the *Herald*, is only a trivial circumstance compared with the combat between two hens and a rat which took place this morning. At five o'clock a mother hen was airing a brood of ten chickens in a yard on Queen street, when suddenly a large grey rat appeared on the scene and attempted the capture of a chick. The hen, with wings extended, stood in an attitude of defiance, and as his rashness proceeded to capture the chicken, she attacked him with the fury of a tiger. A lively battle followed, in which the rat proved more than a match for the hen. She soon showed signs of the vanquished. But fortunately another hen arrived, and a combined attack was made upon the intruder with claw and bill. He fought with the courage of a gladiator but was soon *hors du combat*, and as he attempted to retreat the infuriated hens hemmed him in and inflicted such severe wounds on his rump that his squeal awoke several residents who were slumbering in the neighborhood.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

GREEN BAY, Wis., June 15. Reports from the west and north of this place of the continuance and damage by the high water continue to come in. All the small streams to the north are overflowed. The water at Oconto is two to four feet deep over two-thirds of the city. The damage to the Oconto and lumber interest is \$250,000. Business is suspended.

GRAND RAPIDS, Wis., June 15. The Wisconsin River is rising rapidly. The whole business portion of the city is under water and a portion swept away.

CINCINNATI, June 15. One of the heaviest rain storms known for a long time visited this city between 8 and 11 o'clock last night. The rain fall was more than three inches. All the telegraph wires to the north and east went down except one, showing that a heavy storm passed to the north of the city. It is reported that the depot at Hamilton, Butler County, Ohio, was struck by lightning and burned. A special from Kokomo, Ind., says the cyclone visited a point near Frankfort, Cicero, in that county, destroying many buildings, several persons reported killed and many wounded.

TORONTO, June 15. Decoursier, who was to be hanged tomorrow for the murder of his brother, committed suicide this morning, at 7 o'clock, with prussic acid, while the night and day guards were being changed. He took up a glass of water and drank it, and fell down dead instantly.

LONDON, June 15. The *Times* is informed that the Chinese Minister, in consequence of the delay in receipt of final instructions, has postponed for a short time his departure for St. Petersburg.

The *Standard* announces that the government has informed the United States that the supplies, stores, &c., left in the Arctic regions by the expedition under Sir George Nares, are at the disposal of the American expedition now in those regions.

A Scutari correspondent says:—The Turks hold this fortress and town. There are 6,000 Catholics and 1,500 Mussulmen in Tuzia under joint command of Hodo Bey and Meriditi Prince Hodge. Osman Pasha emphatically denies having encouraged an insurrection.

BERLIN, June 15. The North German *Gazette* has been empowered to publish certain remarks on the church bill, professedly uttered by Bismarck, to the effect that the Government must cling to the measure until confronted with its official rejection by either house of Prussian Parliament.

TORONTO, June 15. The *Globe* this morning contains the following special cable dated London, Monday, June 14th:—

Sir Alexander Gait has announced, through the Allans, that the department of Agriculture is authorized to make advances to a number of navvies, to pay their fares to Quebec and Manitoba on condition of their signing an agreement to repay the advances from wages earned while employed by contractors on the Canadian Pacific Railroad. Employment will be provided for 3,000 laborers for three years.

BOMBAY, June 15. A correspondent telegraphs, as the government has refused official permission to Colonel Gordon to go to China, he tendered his resignation of his military commission before leaving India.

CONDENSED DESPATCHES. The *Times* blames Gladstone for opposing O'Donnell's motion respecting Chalmet-Lacour. Telegrams from Buenos Ayres say that war is imminent. A telegram from Montevideo says skirmishing has commenced. The British squadron in the River Plate will proceed to Buenos Ayres. Five hundred of Sitting Bull's band have surrendered to the Americans, being starved out of Canadian territory. U. S. Secretary Evarts will demand satisfaction from Spain immediately as to the firing on the schr. "Ethel A. Merritt."
