

Anniversary Items.

THURSDAY, Sept 18.—On September 18, 1721, Matthew Prior, the great poet and diplomatist, went to rest. He was born four years after the restored monarchy of Charles II, and one year before "The great Plague" of London. He published the "Poetical Works," 1709. After the Treaty of Utrecht, which terminated the wars of Queen Anne, and secured the Protestant succession in England, he became ambassador to France (1733-1741), but his "History of his own Time" was not printed till 1740.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WAR IN CHINA A Desperate Fight. THE FRENCH VICTORIOUS.

LONDON, Sept. 17. A despatch just received from Foo Chow says the French fleet suddenly appeared at the mouth of the Min River this morning and after landing 2,000 marines again proceeded to demolish the fortifications at Kenhai Pass, which had been repaired since the recent bombardment. The landing party attacked the Chinese camps in the vicinity, and after desperate fighting the Chinese were defeated with great loss. The French were largely outnumbered; but the shells from the French men-of-war did such efficient execution that the Chinese were soon compelled to abandon their works, and becoming dismayed at the sight of the land forces, retreated up the river in confusion. It is expected the French forces will follow up their victory and rid the river Min of Chinese soldiers from its mouth to the arsenal, so as to prevent in future such mistakes by the Chinese as the killing of Lieut. Hubbard on the British war ship Zephyr. Despatches from Foo Chow state that the English residents and officers there are much agitated over the death of Lieut. Hubbard, who was wounded when the Chinese fired on the Zephyr. The Chinese are severely blamed for their action, though it is conceded that the affair was the result of a misunderstanding.

The Cholera.

NAPLES, Sept. 17. The cholera continues to abate. There is a marked decrease in the number of fresh cases. Marseilles, Sept. 17. Reports from sixteen towns in France make a total of thirty deaths from cholera during the past twenty-four hours. No deaths occurred at Toulon.
