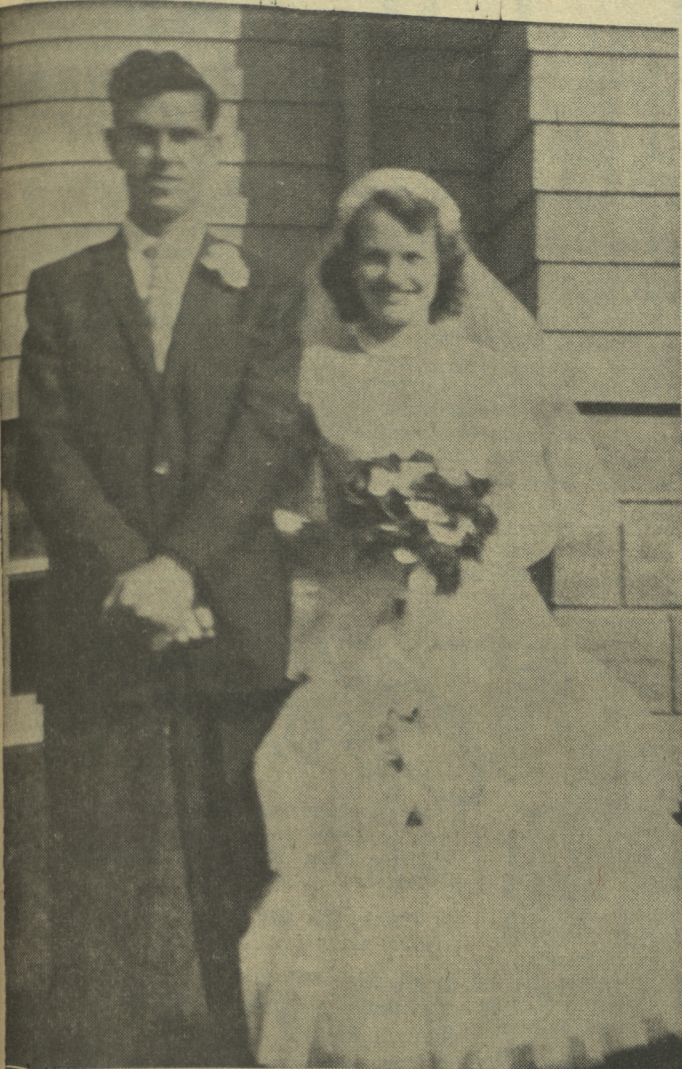


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Lovely Autumn Wedding Held At Saint George's

For the honeymoon trip to Virginia and points of interest in the south-eastern states, the bride changed to a beige suit with chocolate - brown trim Ontario.

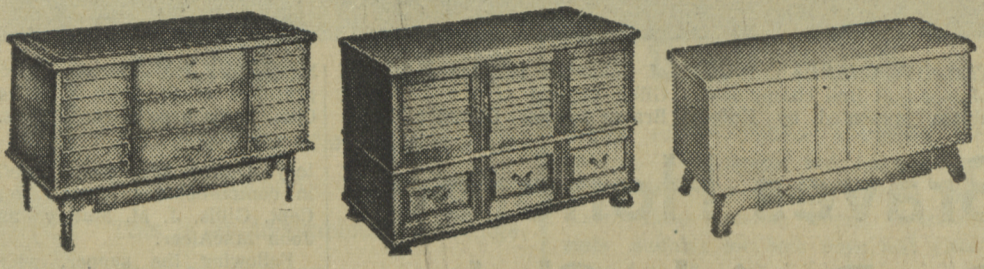
