**THE COMMANDING GENERAL.**

SIR REDVERS BULLER is well known to the Boers; for he went in from Utrecht with General Wood's "flying column" in the Zulu war, and many Transvaal burghers saw his methods. He surprised them by his "eye to the country," his coolness in the most dangerous crisis, as at Hlobane, and his marvellous rapidity in slipping up a position. At the head of now one, now another, troop of his Rough Horse, he personally conducted numerous patrols for miles from the camp—scouring the country in every direction—and acquiring a knowledge of the country that should prove invaluable. Buller is a soldier of action, hard, stern, and self-reliant, and feeling his iron grip, every soldier becomes inspired with confidence. So strong is the influence which he exercises in the field, that a general officer has been heard to say that were he fortunate enough to have Redvers Buller under his command, he would reckon him equal to 1,000 men because of the confidence with which he inspires the fighting unit. It has been said that Buller does not value cavalry. This, of course, is an absurdity. Buller's Horse in the Zulu war, and his Frontier Horse in the Cape border war, were used by him to the fullest advantage in scouting, in breaking an attack in force, and in covering the advance of an army. Buller's handling of the Rough Horse was the admiration of old border fighters; and it is confidently expected that he will use the cavalry in a way that will discomfit the Boers, and throw their tactics out of gear.

**OPINION IN MONTREAL.**

THE intense feeling aroused in Montreal, in view of the struggle in South Africa and the early refusal of the Canadian Government to send a contingent of soldiers, was shown by a remarkable incident that occurred on the Montreal Board of Trade on Thursday last. As is usual in the early part of the afternoon, the room was crowded by Montreal business men, and the absorbing topic was the latest news from the seat of war. Suddenly one of the members started to sing "Rule Britannia." Instantly everyone in the crowded hall joined in the patriotic song, and the walls of the Board of Trade building echoed with the voices of hundreds of Montreal's citizens. "Rule Britannia" was followed by "God Save the Queen," and then, led by W. W. Ogilvie, the great Manitoba Miller, the members gave three rousing cheers and a tiger. It was a spontaneous and splendid outburst of patriotism that would have made Mr. Tarte tremble if he had been present. The echo of it, even, seems to have affected the Government; for, since then a Canadian contingent has been ordered in spite of Mr. Tarte and his myrmidons. Tarte is not "Master of the Administration" as against the united public opinion of Canada.

**SIR CHARLES'S VIEWS.**

In the course of an interview at Montreal, Sir Charles Tupper was asked to give his views regarding the sending of a Canadian contingent. He replied:

I need not say how strongly I feel on this important matter, in which I regard the honor and character of Canada as being at stake. On the morning of October 5th I sent the following telegram to the premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier:

Yarmouth, N. S., Oct. 5, 1899

"Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Ottawa, Ont.: 'I hope you will send a contingent of Canadian volunteers to aid England in the Transvaal. I know it will be warmly welcomed by the British government, be of great service to Canada, and promote the unity of the empire. A friend of mine will insure the lives and limbs at his own expense to a million dollars, and I will heartily support in parliament your action in this matter.'"

"I have read," continued the conservative chieftain, "with great indignation the denunciation in the Patrie, supposed to emanate from Mr. Tarte, of any attempt to send a Canadian force to aid the British government in this important matter. I believe that the overwhelming sentiment of the Dominion is not only in favor of active aid being given by Canada, but that the failure to do so will be strongly resented as inflicting a great injury upon the country."

These are the sentiments of an able and loyal statesman Sir Charles seems to have influenced the government.

**Fighting Near Kimberley.**

**PARTICULARS OF ATTACK ON TRAIN.**

A Bloody One-Sided Encounter—General Buller Leaves for the Cape.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Oct. 14.—According to a despatch from the front, the Boers have made several attacks upon Mafeking, all of which have been repulsed.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—The Exchange Telegraph Company has received a despatch from Cape Town, dated this morning saying that the Boers have blown up another armored train carrying telegraph operators from Mafeking.

DURBAN, Oct. 14.—Authentic news has reached here that 3,000 Boers camped at Ingogo battle-field last evening.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—The Boers, it is reported, have seized the railway station north of Foutteen. Streamers are flying between Burburge and Kimberley, after fighting which is still continuing in the neighborhood.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—Details are at hand regarding the destruction of the armored train at Kraaipan.

These show that Captain Nesbitt who was in command of the train was warned at Maribogo that the Boers held the line. He replied that he was to proceed.

On nearing Kraaipan the train dashed into a culvert that had been blown up by the Boers who were lying in wait for the train.

The Boer artillery immediately opened fire and a desperate one-sided fight appears to have ensued lasting four hours. It is reported that the Boers lost heavily, but there is no means of verifying this.

Two miles of rails were torn up. There is no authoritative confirmation of the report that a battle has been fought in Natal between General Stewart White and Orange Free State troops although there is no question that the Boers have crossed the frontier at several points.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—A story is published here to the effect that the Boers offer £50,000 for the capture of Cecil Rhodes, dead or alive.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—General Buller started today for South Africa.
