## Pearson Arrives Today To Plug Liberal Cause

Tonight Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson arrives at the Charlottetown airport to visit Charlottetown for approximately 16 hours.

He will not visit either the constituencies of Prince or Kings on this, his only trip to P.E.I. during the 1965 election campaign.

Mr. Pearson will be accompanied by his wife and they will arrive at the Charlottetown airport at 5:30 this evening.

On hand to meet them will be Mr. and Mrs. W.R. Jenkins, Dr. and Mrs. M.L. Bonnell, the four Island Liberal candidates and their wives, Mayor and Mrs. Walker Cox, Mr. and Mrs. John P. Nicholson and Mrs. Aiden Mullaigh.

Travelling in the prime minister's party will be his executive assistant James Coutts and his wife and John Nichol, president of the Liberal Federation of Canada, and Mrs. Nichol.

The Lovat Scots Pipe Band will be at the airport and the Prime Minister and his party will be taken into Charlottetown by a motorcade composed of members of the Junior Liberals from all over the Island.

**MOTORCADE**  
The motorcade will travel from Brackley Point Road to the St. Peter's Road to Easton St. to Great George St. to Grafton to Queen and from Queen Street the motorcade will go to the Charlottetown Hotel.

The Prime Minister will rest and have dinner at the hotel before going to a reception in his honor in the foyer of the Confederation Centre shortly after 8:00 p.m.

During the reception he will make a short speech, not more than 20 minutes according to local party officials, and mingle with the people to hear their views.

The reception will be over by 10 o'clock and the Prime Minister and his party will return to the hotel where they will spend the evening.

The Prime Minister will leave the hotel for the airport by nine on Sunday morning for a flight back to Ottawa.

## Theatre Program Date Announced

Confederation Centre Theatre will begin its "Autumn Showcase '65" on Oct. 29 it was announced yesterday by theatre director, Bob Dubberley.

Included in the four evenings at the Centre's theatre will be two comedies by Halifax's Neptune Theatre Company, a concert by the Halifax Symphony Orchestra and an evening with Canada's exponents of folk music, Ian and Sylvia.

Tickets for the programs may be purchased at a series price at the Confederation Centre box office.

Curtain time for all performances is 8:30 p.m. Showcase '65 to include as much variety as possible," Mr. Dubberley said, "and have invited artists who have proven themselves in the past both on this stage and in other parts of the country."

On Oct. 29 the Neptune Theatre will present the classic Shakespearean comedy "As You Like It". This is a very successful comedy and has delighted audiences for more than 400 years.

The following night, Oct. 30, the Neptune Company returns with a sophisticated comedy "Tunnel of Love". This play enjoyed a long Broadway run a couple of years ago, and when performed in Halifax recently the theatre was filled to capacity.

**CLOSE SEASON**  
The Charlottetown performances will close the Neptune Company's third season. Neptune has gained stature with each season and has been hailed by critic Nathan Cohen and others as one of the most accomplished repertory companies in North America.

The company is currently on a Maritime tour which will take it

to several centers in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia prior to the Confederation Centre engagement.

The Halifax Symphony will play one performance only on Wednesday, Nov. 17, John Fenwick, familiar to Islanders as music director for Summer Festival '65, and now assistant artistic director of Summer Festival '66, will lead the orchestra in a full program of works by the great composers.

Autumn Showcase '65 winds up on Friday, Nov. 26, with folkingers Ian and Sylvia. The young Canadians, will present a mixed program of blues, ballads, mountain music and French Canadian ditties.

Negotiations are being carried out with the F.G. Spencer Company Ltd. on the possibility of leasing the theatre for a few weeks during the winter months. No decisions have been reached on this matter as yet.

### TRAINING OPPORTUNITY

**Puericulture and Care of the Sick Child**

Through the cooperation of the Government of the Province of Quebec and the Centenary Commission of Canada, l' Hopital Marie Enfant, Montreal will enrol in January, 1966 two students from each province and two Indians in its School of Puericulture and Care of the sick child. This will be the hospital's contribution to Canadian unity.

The training period is 18 months and instruction will be in both French and English.

Applicants must be between the ages of 17½ and 30 and have Junior University Matriculation standing. The Hospital Marie Enfant will assume the cost of travelling and school expenses including room, board, laundry supplies and uniforms. An allowance of \$333.00 for the period will also be paid each student.

Interested students should apply to the Department of Education, Charlottetown before October 30, 1965.

**HALIFAX (CP)** — The weather office says rain or showers were being reported from the Maritimes Friday evening. Thunderstorms were occurring in New Brunswick.

An intense disturbance over Northern Quebec will move eastward through Labrador today. While unseasonably warm temperatures will occur tonight, cooler air will sweep through the three provinces today. Mostly cloudy skies with isolated showers are expected once the cooler air arrives. Winds will remain strong.

Sunday a high pressure area should cross the district to provide mostly sunny skies.
