Miscellaneous News.

The title of Mr. Edward Jenkins' new novel is "Scutchunee and Dilloo."

The Chinese quarters and a number of stores and dwellings at Auburn, Cal., were burned on the 3rd inst., loss \$75,000.

The Ontario Gazette offers \$200 reward for the arrest of George Glenn, concerned in the Fradett murder in Rawdon township.

There seems to be a good deal of trouble about the Sitting Bull Commission. Nobody seems desirous of taking that "Bull" by the horns.

The expense of the New York fire department is over one and a quarter million dollars annually, including over a million for salaries.

Bishop O'Connell (Roman Catholic), of California, has announced to his congregations that, according to instructions received from Rome, no Roman Catholic can participate in "round dances."

Montevideo was visited by a remarkable hailstorm on the 2nd July. The hailstones were about the size of hens' eggs, and one of them was found to measure 3 1/2 by 2 1/2 inches. All the exposed glass in the town was broken.

Mr. Thomas Hedley, barrister-in-law, of Newton, Northumberland, who died ten days ago at Newcastle, has bequeathed upwards of £200,000 for the endowment of a bishopric for the county of Northumberland. The deceased gentleman, who has for many years resided at Newcastle, was largely connected with collieries in the North of England.

Earl Beaconsfield is bestowing the church patronage almost exclusively upon the lay church party, to the intense disgust of his churchmen.

Earl Russell celebrated his 85th birthday August 18. It is 64 years since he first entered Parliament as member for Tavistock and 31 since he assumed his first premier ship.

Rev. Dr. Anthony Thorold has just been consecrated Bishop of Rochester, England. The Archbishop of Canterbury was assisted by eight other prelates in the consecration.

The Queen, contrary to the usual custom in such cases, has given £100 to the St Alban's Abbey Restoration Fund on account of the great historical and antiquarian interest attached to the building.

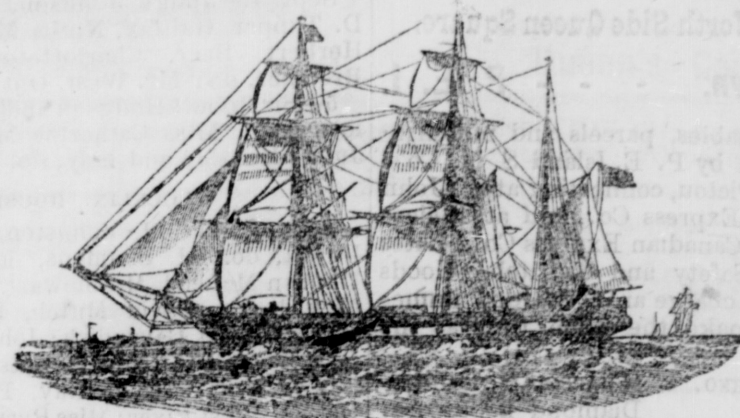

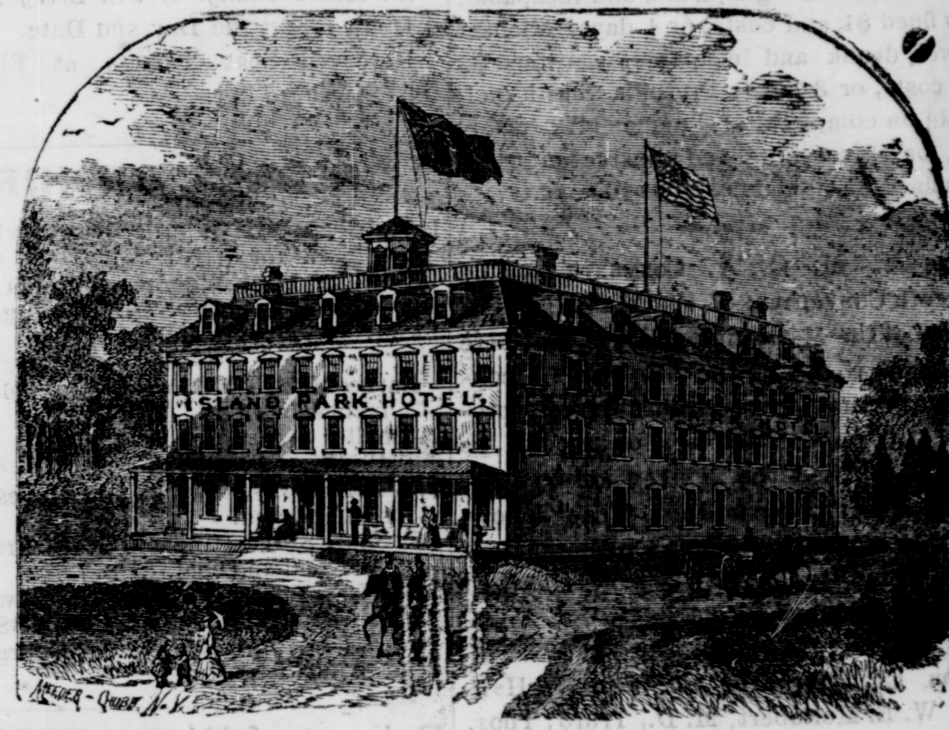
