Special Meeting Of Montague Odd Fellows, Rebekahs

Mrs. A. D. MacKenzie was the guest speaker at a largely attended meeting of Rebekahs and Odd-fellows and their friends held in the I.O.O.F. Lodge Rooms, Montague, Thursday night. The meeting was held in commemoration of the birthday of Brother Schuyler Colfax, founder of the Rebekahs degree, and at one time, vice-president of the United States. At the close of the regular lodge session, the Noble Grand, Mrs. Archie Hilchey, introduced Mrs. MacKenzie who held the attention of her appreciative audience for nearly an hour while she vividly portrayed her visit to Oberammergau, where she was one of more than five thousand persons attending the portrayal of the Passion Play. Mrs. MacKenzie told how she was privileged to make the trip to Europe in 1930, and as she related in detail her experience and impressions, she painted a mental picture that will long remain with her listeners. She described the people, their dress, habits and customs. She also pointed out how the Passion play originated nearly three hundred years ago, and has been reproduced every decade ever since with only one exception -- 1940. In closing, Mrs. MacKenzie quoted from "The Messiah", "He Shall Reign Forever as King of Kings and Lord of Lords." A hearty vote of appreciation was moved by Mr. C. A. Shaw and the motion was seconded by Mrs. Nellie Fraser.

A brief address was read by Mrs. Byron Stewart, outlining the institution of the Rebekah degree by Brother Colfax, one hundred years ago, thus beginning the largest women's organization in the world and having, at present, approximately 600,000 members. A solo "Beneath the Cross of Jesus", was beautifully rendered by Mrs. Douglas Coffin, and the hymns "Go To Dark Gethsemane", and "Have You Been in the Garden With Jesus", were very feelingly sung by Mrs. J. D. MacLeod, soprano, and Mrs. D. M. Johnston, alto, with Mrs. D. M. MacDonald at the piano, a sing-song was heartily enjoyed by all. Refreshments were served by a committee of the members.

Souris Company Preparing For Fisheries Expansion

The Eastern Packing Company of Souris is preparing for the expansion of the fishing industry in the Eastern part of the Province. A building on the company's wharf, once owned by the firm of Matthew & McLean, is to be remodelled immediately to serve as a filleting plant. Carpenters and laborers are expected to start the reconstruction and renovating job very shortly.

Provision will also be made for a fish meal plant of moderate size but capable of expansion if business warrants it. It is known already that Island firms are prepared to supply their by-product of the industry in considerable quantities. Eastern Packers report a shortage of ice due to the mild winter but the company has been able to store a reasonably good supply in spite of difficulties. It may be necessary to import ice from Moncton. Dredging operations to be undertaken at the company's wharf will permit draggers to tie up adjacent to its filleting plant, easing the problem of quick handling of catches. The net result of the contemplated improvements will be the employment of more people for a longer period each year, and it is believed greater returns to fishermen. By the first week in May fifty girls and twenty five men will probably be employed by Eastern Packers. Experienced fishermen cannot agree as to whether the dragger which starts fishing in April will return to port with codfish or haddock. Some maintain that only cod are running at this time of year, others believe that haddock are, always available in the area between Cape Breton and this Province.
