FATHER BURKE'S VINDICATION.

A LARGE part of Father Burke's letter to THE EXAMINER of to-day is unnecessary. All that he says respecting the newspapers which have criticized Archbishop Cleary's mandate had better not have been said. The Globe, The Star, THE EXAMINER, all living in the midst of a mixed religious community, and desiring that good feeling should prevail, cannot possibly have desired to misrepresent Archbishop Cleary's pastoral as it was published to the world, and would not, we feel sure, have condemned it if they had not felt that it really deserved to be censured by public opinion. Father Burke says that the Archbishop has been misunderstood, and charity demands that we give the learned prelate the benefit of Father Burke's plea in his behalf. Father Burke maintains that the Archbishop referred to "a particular marriage," and that he did not refer to non-Catholic marriages in general, which, when contracted by baptized persons, are really sacramental whether they think so or not. We accept this plea, even though it does not agree logically, with the Archbishop's declaration that no Catholic can attend or assist in such a sacramental non-Catholic marriage without rendering himself "guilty of a mortal sin" and "giving public scandal before society." Perhaps Father Burke will kindly explain away this difficulty, which is, indeed, practically the gist of the whole matter, and the point to which THE EXAMINER took exception.

It is needless to say that we fully agree with Father Burke's remarks as to the sanctity of marriage and the importance of maintaining it. The habit of contracting marriages in drawing-rooms and other places of common resort for ordinary purposes is, we think, to be deprecated as tending to lower the public estimation of the sacredness and the inviolability of the marriage tie. The most fitting place for a ceremony of such high importance is surely that in which the people congregate for the purpose of worshipping God; and Protestants as well as Catholics will do well if they insist that the marriage contract shall be made in their places of public worship. If Christians, in common, were permitted to attend marriages in such places, rejoicing in the happy consummation and praying in common to the common Father of all for a blessing upon it, we think that the fact might be, not denounced as a "crime," but accepted as practical testimony to the truth of the Psalmist's words: "Oh, what a sweet and pleasant thing it is, brethren to dwell together in unity."

The claim has been made by Prof. Robertson and others who have inspected the meat markets of Great Britain that large quantities of Canadian beef are sold to consumers as "Prime English." In the North British Agriculturist of October 26th last we see it stated that "The public have no conception of the large amount of foreign meat which is sold even in some of the best shops in Edinburgh as 'Prime Scots.'"

An extraordinary motor car has been patented in France. It is composed of two large wheels five feet in diameter, mounted on a common axle, the body being between the wheels. The motor revolves at high speed round a vertical axis, and, acting like a gyroscope, keeps the vehicle from tipping over. The steering apparatus is very intricate.

The uniform case carried by Gordon Pasha into Lower Egypt has just been recovered, and restored to his family through a nephew, Major Gordon, now stationed at Cairo. It is in a fair state of preservation but appears to have been used by its Egyptian captors for many purposes, including the carriage of dates or grain. It was found on board a dervish barge loaded with the women of the Khalifa's followers retreating from Berber.

GOSSIP ON THE ROUNDS.

Mrs. Hetty Green, said to be the richest woman in America, has been interviewed regarding her wealth and aims in life. In the course of the conversation she said:—"I do not think I am the richest woman in America. It is true I am rich. I have been blessed in my investments, and that is all. I don't know that my fortune is due to any fixed principles. I only use common sense. I buy when things are low and no one wants them. I keep them until they go up and people are crazy to get them. That is, I believe, the secret of all successful business." Asked "Why don't you stop and enjoy yourself?" she replied:—"I don't know. I look upon my property largely as a trust. I take care of it on much the same principle that you would take care of a valuable animal were it left in your charge. You see, my father had the idea that the money which one inherited should be given over undiminished to the next generation. He thought the person who inherited it had the full right to the use of the income, but that he ought not to spend the principal. This is the way I have felt.

The community forming the British colony of the Falkland Islands should be a very happy one. From the latest report of the administrator it seems that there are no direct taxes—unless a trifling levy on houses in Stanley, the capital, to maintain a fence round the town, and one on pastoral land to eradicate the scab disease amongst the sheep, can be called by this name—the assets are much in excess of the liabilities, society is enlivened by the frequent presence of Her Majesty's ships, the climate is so excellent that there has been complete immunity from all diseases, whether of an epidemic or an endemic nature, and the colonial surgeon thinks that such a satisfactory state of things, due to the health-giving qualities peculiar to these islands, may reduce health seekers to visit these happy lands on the fringe of the Atlantic to recuperate their shattered energies. The imports last year amounted to £69,985, and consisted mainly of clothing, provisions, coal, tobacco, and the other things that a community of about two thousand British born people would require. The exports amounted to £132,194, and consisted wholly of wool, sheepskins, and tallow. Practically the whole trade, import and export, is with the United Kingdom. Sheep breeding is the business of the Island; hence the importance of eradicating the disease already mentioned, and of maintaining and improving the breed.

Mail and Empire: Mr. Noel, the Conservative candidate in Drummond and Arthabaska, left the Liberal ranks to fight against a Liberal majority of 1,200. Should he win Drummond and Arthabaska will have a merry Christmas.

Montreal Gazette: There is a curious delay in connection with the taking over by the Government of the Drummond County Railway. The money was obediently voted by the governments majority in Parliament. The line has been built and put in a condition to run trains over. The company is now ready—even anxious—to give it to the Government in return for what some scoffers have called the Greenfields annuity. Why the delay? It cannot be possible that the president is expected to arrange a cheque to provide another winter with a newspaper organ!

THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Rolled Down For More Easy Reading.

Mount Vesuvius is in great activity, and two wide streams of lava are flowing in the direction of Vitrova.

The New South Wales Assembly has passed a Federation Enabling Act Amendment bill, providing that at least 18,000 electors shall give an affirmative vote in favor of such a step before New South Wales enters into a federal union with the other Australian colonies.

Over a thousand names, many of them those of leading merchants of the province, have been appended to a business men's petition asking the Ontario Government not to re-establish in the Central Prison the burned binder twine factory. The prejudice against prison made goods seems to pervade commercial as well as labor circles.

It has taken seven years to build the colossal mausoleum of Czar Alexander II. in the Kremlin at Moscow. The statue, by On-konchine, is sixteen feet high; it stands on a pedestal of Finland granite twenty-three feet high, and is surrounded by a granite cupola the gilt bronze roof of which rises to a height 100 feet. It has cost 1,500,000 rubles.

Tom Nulty, who confessed to having killed three sisters and a brother near Rawdon, has been found guilty of murder by the coroner's jury and his preliminary trial began yesterday. The shirt which Nulty wore when he committed the crime has been found. It was stowed away among the rafters in the garret of the Nulty home. The only reason assigned for the murder is that Tom was anxious to marry, and there was not room enough in the house for the prospective bride.
