

PLEASURE EXCURSIONS.—The Steamer *Rose* took a party of about 150 persons, on a pleasure excursion, to Mount Stewart Bridge, some sixteen miles up the Hillsboro' River—on Tuesday the 21st inst., where they all landed for some three or four hours, to partake of refreshments, laid out on the delightful grounds in the vicinity of the Bridge; and at 4 o'clock, a. m. they again embarked and returned to town.

On Friday last a numerous and respectable party of ladies and gentlemen hired the Steamer *Rose* for a pleasure excursion to Orwell Bay. They left Charlottetown at 10 o'clock, a. m., accompanied by the Sons of Temperance Band, who had kindly volunteered their services for the occasion, playing right merrily some new and favorite airs; and arrived at Port Selkirk at 2 o'clock, when they landed under a salute, fired from the shipyard of Wm. Douse, Esq., and after strolling through the woods for about a mile, pitched their tents and partook of dinner. They re-embarked for Charlottetown at 4 o'clock, and disembarked at Mr. Peake's wharf a little after sun-set. The day was beautifully fine, and all enjoyed themselves from the oldest to the youngest, and the only complaint we heard was uttered by a lady, who said that such trips were too much like angels' visits, few and far between.

We were much pleased last Evening in witnessing Mr. ABOURNET'S Scientific Lecture on various subjects. The performances of the Fire King, eating red hot coals of fire, drinking liquid fire, &c. were well done. He gave some very curious and beautiful Chemical views and Optical Illusions and Electrical Experiments. He concluded his Entertainment with giving the Nitrous Oxide or Laughing Gas to several persons present, which afforded much amusement. After the company left the room, he let off, near the Market House, a large Balloon, which, continued in sight for about 20 minutes, wending its way up the Hillsborough. Mr. Abournet intends exhibiting again this Evening.

TEMPERANCE LECTURE AND DECLARATION.—A most animating and highly interesting Lecture was delivered by Mr. Arch. Macneil, Vernon River, in the Salem Chapel, Murray Harbour, on Monday evening the 25th of August, at the close of which, 18 Members were enrolled, and it was unanimously resolved, that a Temperance Demonstration and Festival should take place on the 4th instant, and notwithstanding the limited notice, and the necessary preparations requisite for such an occasion, (it being the first ever celebrated in the Settlement), the friends of Temperance, with a zeal commendable in the prosecution of the good cause, commenced operations, and by the time appointed, every thing was prepared in elegant style, displaying much skill and judgment in the undertakers. A tent was erected, shaded with boughs and canvass, for the accommodation of the guests, which forcibly reminded us of Balaam's Benediction on the Tribes of Israel, "How goodly are thy tents, O. acob, and thy tabernacles, O Israel!" Num. chap. 14, verse 5. The Tables were amply stored with a variety of delicacies highly creditable to the females who presided over that department of the business, and nearly 200 persons sat down to partake of the dainties provided, and the "cup that cheers but not inebriates," to which ample justice having been done, the Assembly, was addressed by the Rev. Mr. Whitlock, and Mr. Archibald Mr. Macneil, and the usual resolutions having been passed, they dispersed to their homes highly pleased and gratified by the unanimous display of firm adherence to the principles of Total Abstinence which pervades the breast of the majority of this community.
