We would advise all to pay up at once and save expenses. At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court to-day two drunks were disposed of—one for \$3 or 14 days, the other for \$2 or 8 days. Two young men charged with fighting on the streets stand over for trial until Monday. THE annual meeting of the Young Women's Christian Association will be held on Tuesday next, 22nd March, at 3.30 p. m., in the basement parlour of the Y. M. C. A. Friends and members are invited to attend. L. O. KELLY, Esq., M. P. P., had a serious surgical operation performed on his eyes a few days ago, from which he will be confined to his room for some time. We are glad to know he is doing well under the circumstances, and we trust that the operation will be entirely successful. MR. RICHARD BAGNALL, of New Glasgow, yesterday sold 54 carcasses of pork, averaging 300 pounds each, to Messrs. J. H. Myrick & Co., realizing thereon about \$1000. Mr. Gregor, of Brackley Point, also sold 13 carcasses, averaging upwards of 300 pounds, to the same firm. Both gentlemen are to be congratulated on their success as pork raisers. ACCORDING to popular belief there is a difference of 47 minutes between local and standard time. According to railway time there is but 43 minutes difference. Either the town time or the railway time is wrong. This disparity is causing considerable inconvenience to travellers, many of whom have missed their trains as a result. We trust that, now that attention has been called to this matter, the necessary change in time will be made at once. The agent visited that place on Wednesday to see about getting her out. He reports that there are upwards of two miles of heavy pack ice ranging from eighteen inches to six feet in thickness outside the breakwater. From the deck of the steamer no water can be seen, but from the edge of the board ice the running Gulf ice can be distinctly observed. Mr. Macdonald, lighthouse keeper at Panmure Island, states that all to the south of the light is filled with heavy drift ice. It is more than likely the steamer will not commence her trips until early in April. THE market to-day was fairly well attended and stocked, notwithstanding the disagreeable travelling. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) ST. PATRICK'S DAY. How it was Celebrated. LONDON, March 17. A feature of the observance of St. Patrick's Day in England was the appearance of many Englishmen wearing shamrocks. A sheet and snow storm stopped all outdoor demonstrations in Dublin, and the trooping of the colors, usually one of the events of the celebration of St. Patrick's Day there, did not take place to-day. It is feared that riots will ensue from the celebration at Lurgan County and Armagh. Two hundred extra police have been added to the regular force. NEW YORK, March 17. St. Patrick's Day was generally observed by the sons of Ireland in this city. On the municipal departments and many of the city buildings a green flag was thrown to the breeze. Irish societies paraded in two distinct bodies. There were also parades in Brooklyn and Jersey City. MONCTON, March 17. The sons of Erin celebrated St. Patrick's Day with more than usual display. Father Dollard, of St. John, lectured in the evening. Subject: "The Irish Idea." OTTAWA, March 17. St. Patrick's Day was celebrated here by flag flying, &c. Accident in a Church. CHICAGO, March 17. A panic occurred at the Roman Catholic Church of the Nativity, this afternoon. The church was crowded. By the breaking of a platform 200 persons were precipitated ten feet. A rush was made and many persons were injured badly by being trampled on. Fortunately, no one was killed. DUBLIN, March 17. Beyond a few scurrillages in Londonderry and elsewhere, St. Patrick's day was observed in an orderly manner throughout Ireland. A Vice-Regal Residence. MONTREAL, March 17. At a late meeting of the City Council the question of a vice-regal residence was again brought up, when a letter was read from Mr. Erasmus Wyman, of New York, offering to furnish the reception rooms with the best suite of furniture he could get. Catholic News. ROME, March 17. At a consistory to-day the new Cardinals were hatted. The Pope also recognized the new Archbishops and Bishops in Canada, United States and Australia. The Pope has also telegraphed to the Czar congratulating him on his escape from assassination. Home Rule. LONDON, March 17. Gladstone delivered a speech at a dinner last night, given by a Yorkshire member. He stated that there was a growing opinion in favor of Home Rule, even among his former opponents. Another Land Bill. LONDON, March 17. The Cabinet to-day decided upon a Land Purchase Scheme, based upon revised rentals under this scheme, therefore landlords will fare worse than they would under Gladstone's Bill. More Railways. OTTAWA, March 17. Chief Engineer Schreiber says that a large amount of railway construction will go on throughout Canada during the coming summer. Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, March 18—10 a.m. North-west and west winds; cloudy weather with light local rainfalls; not much change in temperature. The Imperial Institute. An official statement was published a few weeks ago of the progress achieved up to the date of February 21 in the establishment of the Imperial Institute. It appears therefrom that, after the official approval had been received for the report of December 29, two great meetings—to which we have already called attention—were held, at which the objects of the scheme were made known. The organizing staff, under the direction of Sir Fred. Abel, C. B., then began operations. Communications have been addressed to over 3,000 public officials throughout the country, so as to secure the assistance of every city, borough and rural district in the United Kingdom. Encouraging letters were also received from a number of scientific, legal, technical, and other bodies. The replies, in the main, have been of a nature which tends to assure the organizers of the success of the undertaking—90 per cent. of them, at least, being favorable. So far about \$50,000 sterling has been made available for the institute—apart from private contributions from India and the colonies, which are also said to be most satisfactory. Altogether, then, the statement indicates that the form proposed by the Prince of Wales and approved by Her Majesty, has commended itself generally to the Queen's subjects all over her dominions. Mr. Beecher's Death.

AN INCIDENT WHICH MAY ACCOUNT FOR THE FATAL STROKE OF APOPLEXY. A gentleman of New York sends to the Sun an account of an incident which he thinks may account for Mr. Beecher's fatal stroke of apoplexy. He writes that on Thursday evening, when Mr. and Mrs. Beecher were in New York selecting furniture for the Plymouth Church parlors, they got on a Third Avenue car, on which they rode up town. They arose to leave the car as it approached 39th street. The conductor pulled the strap. Mr. Beecher, who appeared to be in vigorous health, did not wait for the car to stop, but got off while it was yet in motion. In doing so he came down hard on his heel. It was an awkward step, and it seemed as if Mr. Beecher had felt the shock somewhat severely. He pressed his right hand to his heart for a moment, and then buttoned his overcoat and pursued his way. 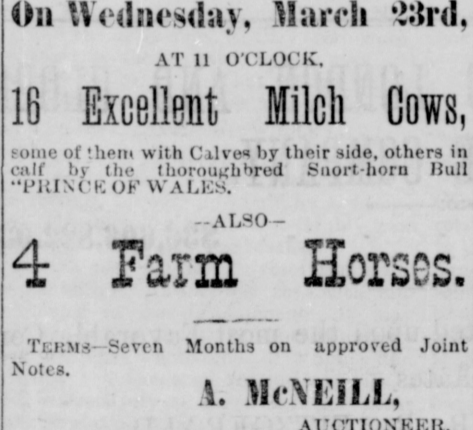
