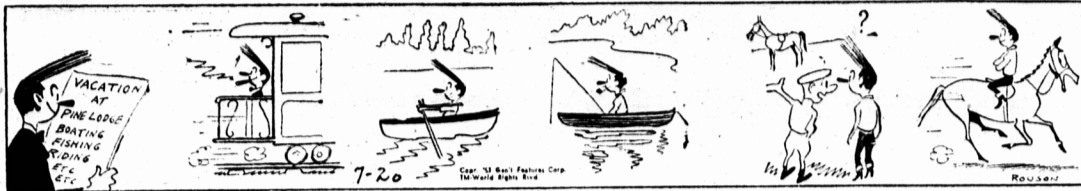

Three New Records Set In Racing Meet Saturday

Abbelland, Esso and Eva Budlong established new marks and Ranida won the first race of her career Saturday night at the Charlottetown Driving Park as the largest crowd of the season witnessed what was the best racing to be seen here, since Old Home Week a year ago.

Abbelland, a sleek brown son of Bert Abbe, owned by J. S. Watts Goguen, lowered his mark by more than two seconds as he won the first dash of the stake race in the brilliant time of 2:08 2/5.

The little pacer from Quebec went away on the pole but had to move up from second position to pass Joseadale Clipper at the quarter mile mark to take over the lead. From the quarter pole to the wire Abbelland was never touched and he came home a good length ahead of the rest of the field.

He also won the second dash of the event in the time 2:10 4/5. His mile of 2:08 2/5 was the fastest in the Maritimes this year.

Esso, the little bay gelding driven by Len O'Meara and owned by Mrs. James Poulton, finished the first dash of the Classified Trot and Pace with a brilliant burst to set a record of 2:11 3/5.

Marion E. and Frankie Budlong set the pace for the first three-quarters with Esso moving up from third position to breeze home a good two lengths in front. Frankie Budlong was second.

Eva Budlong, driven by Harold Stead, led most of the mile in winning the first dash of the Classified Pace and set a record of 2:17 4/5. Ma Cherie surprised the betting public by placing second and paid \$30.00 on a place ticket.

But it was Ranida in the fifth race who won the upset victory of the night. Driven by Randy MacDonald, the little bay daughter of Calumet Budlong won the second dash of the Classified Pace in 2:19 and paid \$45.00 on a win ticket.

Ranida paced most of the mile in fourth position with Eva Budlong leading the way. She moved

up on the upper turn and came home a half length ahead of the improving Bob Clegg.

Joandale won both dashes of the Classified Trot and Pace. She came up from fifth place with a great burst to win the first race and led most of the way in the second dash.

The daily double on Esso and Abbelland paid \$59.00.

Field Of 164 Seeking Two-Province Honors

The annual N.B.-P.E.I. Amateur and Open Golf Tournament gets underway at the Charlottetown Golf Course this morning with 164 golfers from the two provinces competing for the honors. The three day meet concludes on Wednesday.

Over 120 golfers from New Brunswick, including eight professionals and ten juniors, will take part in the match. 35 golfers from Charlottetown and six from Summerside will compete.

Pete Kelly of Fredericton, N.B., the defending Amateur and Open champion, arrived here yesterday. He headed a strong delegation from the New Brunswick club.

Also here for the meet are R. H. Harley of Moncton, a former N. B.-P.E.I. Amateur champion and Don Sinclair of Saint John, who has won the two-province honors on several occasions.

Eleven professionals, eight from New Brunswick, two from Nova Scotia and one from P. E. I. will play for the pro honors. Cecil Dowling, the local Club pro will represent this Province.

The Junior Championship will also be decided at the meet. Twelve juniors, ten from New Brunswick and two from Charlottetown will tee off on their first 18 hole round of medal play this morning.

Errol Nicholson and Harry Simmons are the Charlottetown juniors taking part.

Medal play for the professionals, amateurs and juniors will commence this morning at eight o'clock. The professionals will lead the way followed by the first division of the amateur and then the juniors.

Local golfers taking part in first division play include Bill Beer, Bob Gray, Don MacDonald, Art MacKenzie, Frank McInnis, Doug Saunders and A. G. MacMillan.

Moncton is very strongly represented in the professional competitions and eight in the first division of the amateurs. Other centres with

strong representations are Saint John, St. Andrews, Bathurst, Miramichi, St. Croix, Restigouche, and Fredericton.
