

# Islanders Suffer 2nd Defeat By Beavers

## Mt. A. Retains NB-PEI Rugby Title In 9-5 Win Over SDU Here Saturday

Mount Allison University retained their New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Intercollegiate rugby championship here on Saturday afternoon when they defeated Saint Dunstan's University 9-5 in the final game of the series played over the S.D.U. gridiron.

The victory gave them the title for one year over University of New Brunswick, the other entry in the three-team series, by a margin of one game. Mt. A. chalked up three wins and one loss, while U.N.B. finished with two and two, S.D.U. finished third with one win and three losses.

Coming from behind a 5-3 deficit going into the final half, two smart touchdowns by McConnell, fast, rugged Mt. A. three quarter-backs, scored the title away from the S.D.U. gridiron.

Mount Allison opened the scoring at 8:45 of the first half when MacKinnon went over the corner; of the field on a 25-yard run at the end of a smart backfield attack. Johnny Cash, fast-moving wingman for the Saints tied it up one minute later with a terrific 35-yard dash at the end of another smooth passing play. Halfback George Cameron's penalty placement from 25 yards out at 17:45 put Saints in front at the end of the half.

**Second Half**  
Outplaying the Saints in the closing half to force the ball deep in their zone, McConnell put the Mounties in front by one point when he scored on a smart 20-yard end run at 19:30. In the closing seconds of the game, McConnell again broke out with a smart display of running. Taking the ball from a scrum on the Saints 35-yard line, with only one second left in the game he sped through an opening along the right sideline for a beautiful try. Nose of the tries were converted, John Hill doing the kicking for Mounties and George Cameron for Saints. All were from hard angles against a cross-wind.

It was a closely contested first frame that saw both teams come up with smart running attacks and effective long kicking gains. Both held the advantage at times and pressed close for near scores, but smart defensive work on the part of the defending team at the time, prevented anything more than a well-earned touchdown apiece and a nice piece of place kicking by George Cameron, Saints outside half. Awarded a penalty kick on Mount A.'s 25-yard line, Cameron booted the ball between the uprights for the two-points lead. Taking the kick from a fairly difficult angle and bucking a cross-wind Cameron hit the top of the cross-bar dead center, the ball toppling over for a good entry on the part of the defending team at the time.

But it was a different story in the second half. Making the best of short running and kicking gains, the Mounties took the initiative away from their warring rivals to continually force the play into Saints' territory. A hard working backfield sent wingman McConnell off on two smart scoring runs that clinched the game. The Mounties threatened all through the final half, and rarely let Saints get over the centre field line. It was only determined defensive action on the part of the Saints that prevented Mount A. from going over more than they did.

The official referee for the game was Gordon Bennett of Prince of Wales College.

## Montreal Out Of Grey Cup Playoff Picture

Hamilton's Big Four entry, downgraded for 15 years, pushed to the top of the League Saturday by defeating Ottawa Rough Riders 11-3 in Ottawa. Meanwhile, Montreal Alouettes, holders of the Dominion crown, won over Toronto Argos 18-17 at Toronto but were eliminated from the Grey Cup picture by the Tiger-Cat's victory.

In the Senior Ontario Rugby Football Union final playoffs, Toronto Balmly Beach roared from behind Sunday to a 17-11 victory over Sarnia Imperials. The game, at Toronto, was the first of a total-point playoff series for the O.R.F.U. championship.

Edmonton's Eskimos fought an uphill battle for a 17-16 decision over Winnipeg Blue Bombers at Edmonton Saturday night in the first game of the Western Interprovincial Football Union final. A converted touchdown by Bob Pafra on a pass from Lindy Berry in the last four minutes decided the issue.

In the eastern intercollegiate circuit, the underdog University of Toronto held McGill to a 6-5 tie at Montreal while Queen's Golden Gaels edged Western at Kingston 13-10. Both games were played Saturday.

Tiger-Cats earned their league leading position in the Big Four their first since 1935, in the worst weather of the 1950 football season. Four inches of soft snow, followed by rain, turned the field into a muddy mess by game time. It was close enough, however, as Riders sought a face-saving win and Montreal Alouettes, hoping for a tie with Hamilton, edged Toronto Argonauts 18-17 in Toronto.

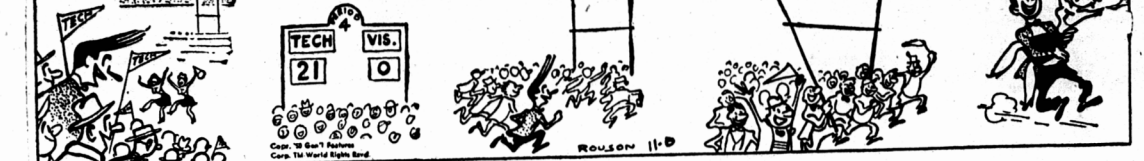
The Big Four results left Hamilton and Toronto to play a two-game, total-point title series.

**Player Banned**  
Import Nick Scollard of the Als knocked jug-of-play Jimmy Simpson to the slush-covered turf in the Als-Argo game with a right to the chin. He was banished from the game and suspended indefinitely.

The blow followed a ruling in which officials called back a Montreal touch-down on a play that isn't specifically covered in the rule book. They held it was illegal for Als to throw a forward pass off a blocked kick and penalized them 25 yards.

Scollard was angered by this ruling and further enraged when another penalty was called against Als on the next play.

### LITTLE SPORT



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The loss for the Saint Dunstan's University rugbyists against Mount A. here on Saturday in N.B.-P.E.I. intercollegiate play, winds up another season for the M.-Adam-coached gridsters. But at the end of the first half, it looked like it might not turn out that way. Playing smart ball in that frame, they held the play on even terms with their rivals, limiting Mounties to one touchdown, while they garnered five points themselves with a touch and a penalty kick to lead at the end of that time by two counters.

Shortly after the final half got underway, however, it was quite evident that the Mounties were not going to be denied their second championship in as many years—and they weren't. Playing a really aggressive game, they forced Saints back continually with short running gains that the Saints didn't seem to be able to cope with, and made them look anything like the team that performed in the first half.

Mount A.'s close playing tactics disrupted most of Saint's attempts at organized play and resulted in ball-handling that the visitors took full advantage of to keep their backfield working on smart passing attacks that paid off with two tries, and came close to a number of others. At the end of fast running attacks, McConnell was the big threat on the field to stretch Mountie's winning margin to four points. The game had actually ended when he crossed the line, but the play had to be completed before the final whistle was blown.

It was the second time in two seasons that the Sackville rugbyists have averted having the series being forced into a three-week deadlock for first place at the end of the regular schedule. In the final game last year against U.N.B. a tie game gave them the edge on points for the title. A victory for Saints on Saturday would have put all three teams in a three-cornered tie with two wins and two losses apiece.

This does not end football for the season however, as the Charlottetown Abbies have still Montreal Cup playoffs ahead of them in Maritime senior rugby competition. They will meet Glace Bay Caledonians at the Cape Breton centre this Saturday in a sudden-death semi-final playoff for the right to advance into the finals.

Judging from all reports, both the coaches and the team, really mean business too. Finding that it was hard to get out for practices early in the morning, the team held a meeting last week to talk it over. The result is that the players are turning out for practices now in the early hours of the morning, at 6:30 to be exact. And any team that will do that, really mean to make a showing in the forthcoming series, and are deserving of all the encouragement that can be given for their all out interest.

The Abbies have plenty of smart material on their roster, and all that is needed is enough conditioning to make them a powerful contender for the Maritime honors. Whether or not their daily, early morning sessions, with very little previous competition will be sufficient to carry them through, is hard to say. But anyone that will get up at that hour of the morning for practice, certainly has the game at heart, and a spirit like that should take them a long way.

Accompanied by coaches Gordon Bennett and Lt. Col. W. J. MacDonald, the team will fly to Cape Breton on Saturday morning and will return by plane the same afternoon following the game. It is understood that the team will hold a special dance here on Wednesday evening to raise funds to defray the costs of the trip. Any sporting fan who wishes to support the deserving efforts of these boys, may do their bit by buying a ticket.

## Thick Fog Ends Game At Halifax; St. Mary's And Hawks Tied 3-All

HALIFAX, Nov. 5 — (CP) — Thick fog broke up a 3-3 overtime game between Halifax St. Mary's and Moncton Hawks last night two minutes and 45 seconds after the extra period opened in a Maritime Senior Hockey League game.

Hockey observers said it was the first time in the history of the Forum that fog, caused by warm weather and structural changes in the building, forced cancellation of a big four game.

Last-place Hawks held their edge until five minutes before the end of the period when Muckle Hollett tipped in Bill Watson's pass for the equalizer.

Mallinson and linesmen Charlie Copps and Bert Sleep had an easy first period. The boys were on their best behavior and it was not until the 10-minute mark that winger Black drew the only penalty — a minor for cross-checking.

Hawks opened the scoring late in the second period when Rod McKenzie made the play for Bill Morrow. Within a minute Saints' goalie locked the score on Eddie Brown's screened slap shot from the blue-line. Goalie Colvin never saw the shot until it was rattling in the meshes.

## Brodeur Outstanding As Saint John Takes Rugged Encounter 3-1

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 5 — (CP) — Saint John Beavers again enacted the giant-killers role in the Maritime Senior Hockey League when they set back the powerful Charlottetown Islanders 3-1 Saturday night.

The Islanders, whose only previous defeat also was inflicted by Beavers, remained a healthy nine points ahead of second place Halifax St. Mary's, with Saint John one point behind and seven above the trailing Moncton Hawks.

Victor Jackson's back-checking and his winning third period tally, coupled with the goaling of Dennis Brodeur, were outstanding in Saint John's second triumph over Charlottetown.

Beavers were ahead 1-0 at the end of the first period after Brodeur had kicked out 14 shots, three of them in the last two seconds of the session and the second being a scorers.

Saint John pushed the count to 2-0 after five minutes of play in the third period and, after the scoring of the lone Charlottetown tally half way through the stanza, fired an insurance goal into an open net during a six-man Charlottetown attack with less than two minutes to go. In a daring move, coach Murren Chamberlain had lifted his goalie with two and a half minutes to play in an effort to tie the score.
